2. 2014 National Citizen Survey

- Charlotte's 2014 National Citizen Survey was administered by the National Research Center, which works in partnership with the International City and County Managers Association and the National League of Cities.
- The survey was sent to a random sample of 3,000 households within the city limits beginning in November 2013, with 400 completed surveys returned in February 2014.
- An overview of the survey results will be presented to the City Council during this Dinner Briefing.

3. Wastewater Plant Operations Agreement with Union County Update

Synopsis

- In mid-2013, Union County decided to seek outside assistance in the operation and maintenance of its five wastewater treatment plants.
- As part of the process, Union County invited the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Utility Department to discuss the potential of the City providing assistance through contract operation of its plants.
- On September 23, 2013, the City Council approved a Memorandum of Understanding and Interim Facilities Management Agreement with Union County to proceed with the necessary due diligence to develop a detailed agreement for the Utility Department to operate and maintain Union's wastewater plants.
- The presentation will provide the goals of the regional partnership and proposed structure of the agreement for the plant operations with Union County.

Future Action

The City Council will be asked to approve the proposed Agreement with Union County for Wastewater Plant Operations at its April 28, 2014 Council Business Meeting.

4. 2014 Housing Trust Fund Development Recommendations

Synopsis

- Neighborhood & Business Services will brief City Council on the 2014 Housing Trust Fund Requests.
- On November 26, 2001, the City Council established a Housing Trust Fund to provide gap financing for diverse housing types serving Charlotte households earning up to 60% (\$38,500) of the Area Median Income.
- Housing Trust Funds are available to developers receiving North Carolina Housing Finance Agency Tax Credit awards for new construction and/or the rehabilitation of existing housing units.
- Since 2002, Housing Trust Fund dollars have financed 4,296 housing units, of which 2,232 have been completed.
- The funding provides local alignment with state-supported developments and allows greater local leverage of tax credit awards.
- To be eligible, the development must meet the requirements of the Housing Locational Policy. Additionally, developers are required to inform the City Council representatives and convene at least one neighborhood meeting to address proposed development.

Future Action

The City Council will be asked to approve the FY2014 Housing Trust Fund Recommendations at its April 28, 2014, Council Business Meeting.

5. 2040 Metropolitan Transportation Plan

Synopsis

- On April 16, 2014, the Charlotte Regional Transportation Planning Organization (CRTPO) is scheduled to adopt the 2040 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP).
- The MTP was previously known as the Long-Range Transportation Plan.
- The contents of the MTP are prescribed by federal guidelines and include the requirement that the MTP demonstrate that funds will be reasonably available to build, operate, and maintain the transportation projects included in the MTP.
- Staff introduced the key content of the 2040 MTP to the Transportation and Planning Committee on February 27 and March 27, 2014.
- On April 3, 2014, the Technical Coordinating Committee of the CRTPO voted unanimously to recommend adoption of the 2040 MTP.
- The purpose of tonight's presentation is to explain the key content of the 2040 MTP.

13. Rezoning Petition 2014-001

Action: Render a decision on proposed rezoning 2014-001 by Weekly Homes, LP:

- From single-family residential (R-5) and mixed-use development, conditional [MUDD (CD)],
- To urban residential, conditional [UR-2 (CD)].

Staff Resource(s): Tammie Keplinger, Planning

Explanation

- The public hearing on this rezoning petition was held on January 21, 2014.
- The Zoning Committee of the Planning Commission reviewed the petition on February 4, 2014, and voted 4-2 to recommend denial.
- At the March 16, 2014, City Council Zoning Meeting, staff noted that the petitioner had made changes to the request based on the discussion at the Zoning Committee meeting.
- The petitioner requested that the petition be referred back to the Zoning Committee for reconsideration.
- In order to avoid further delays for the petitioner, staff requested and Council agreed to render a decision on this petition at the April 14, 2014, Business Meeting.
- The property is approximately 1.02 acres located on the northeast corner at the intersection of Ideal Way and Euclid Avenue. (Council District 1 – Kinsey)
- The petition proposes to allow for the development of up to 21 single-family attached units (for sale), at a density of 20.4 dwelling units per acre (as modified).
- Staff does not recommend approval of this petition. The petition is inconsistent with the Dilworth Land Use and Streetscape Plan, as amended by the previous rezoning, which recommends residential at five units per acre.
- The Zoning Committee reconsidered this petition on March 26, 2014, and voted unanimously to recommend **Approval** of the petition with the following modifications:
 1. The petitioner provided a six-foot sidewalk along Marshall Place.
 2. The sidewalk widths on Euclid Avenue and Ideal Way are clearly labeled on the site plan.
 3. The height of the proposed ornamental fence will be a maximum four feet.
 4. The petitioner has amended the Development Data to clearly specify the existing site area (1.028 acres) and the amount of proposed right-of-way dedication (0.188 acres).
 5. The site plan delineates proposed right-of-way from centerline for all abutting streets. A note has been added to the site plan stating this additional right-of-way will be dedicated and conveyed to the City.
 6. The petitioner has added language to the site plan indicating that the building materials will include brick, stone, and/or other masonry products and HardiPlank or other similar durable siding materials. No vinyl will be used as siding material.
 7. The petitioner has provided language that states no expanses of blank walls exceeding 20 feet in length will be allowed for the two end units that have a side along Euclid Avenue.
 8. The “net” acreage has been removed from the site plan.

9. The proposed density is based on the gross acreage as per the Zoning Ordinance (22.37 dwelling units per acre).
10. The five-foot side yard along the property line abutting the R-5 (single family residential) zoned parcel has been increased to 10 feet.
11. The petitioner has reduced the number of units for the overall development from 23 to 21, resulting in a decrease in density from 22.37 units per acre to 20.4 units per acre.
12. The petitioner has made the following changes to the portion of the development facing Marshall Place:
 - Reduced number of units from eight to six, with a slight increase in the size of the building footprints.
 - Created two triplexes out of the six units with open area/space as separation.
 - Provided an elevation of the proposed triplexes created along Marshall Place.
13. Added language to Architectural Standards note that states the side yard proposed along the property line abutting R-5 zoned property will include a privacy fence and will be landscaped.

14. Public Hearing on the Fiscal Year 2015 Annual Action Plan for Housing and Community Development

Action: Conduct a public hearing on the proposed fiscal year 2015 Annual Action Plan for Housing and Community Development.

Staff Resource(s): Pamela Wideman, Neighborhood & Business Services
Warren Wooten, Neighborhood & Business Services

Policy

- The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) mandates the development of an Annual Action Plan to receive federal funding for housing and community development activities.
- The Fiscal Year 2015 Annual Action Plan (Plan) is the City's annual strategy for providing housing and community development activities.
- The Plan supports the City's housing policy to preserve existing housing, expand the supply of low and moderate-income housing, and support family self-sufficiency.

Explanation

- The fiscal year 2015 Plan includes housing and community development needs and resources for the City and Regional Housing Consortium.
- The Regional Housing Consortium is a partnership between the City, Mecklenburg County, and the towns of Cornelius, Pineville, Matthews, Mint Hill, Huntersville, and Davidson.
- Based on recent notification from the regional HUD Office, in Fiscal Year 2015, the City expects to receive the following federal funding allocation, which includes a 2.5% increase in Community Development Block Grant funding, a 10% increase in HOME Investment and Partnership funding, a 22.7% increase in Emergency Solutions Grants funding, and a 21.4% increase in Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS and HIV funding.
- For Fiscal Year 2015, expected federal funding allocation amounts are provided in the table below:

Federal Funding Allocations	Amount
Community Development Block Grant	\$4,985,075
HOME Investment and Partnerships	\$2,251,986
Emergency Solution Grants	\$ 395,256
Housing Opportunity for Persons with AIDS	\$1,060,906
Total	\$8,693,223

- The final budget is expected to be determined in the next 60-90 days. Should the anticipated funding amounts change, the City Council would not be required to hold another public hearing or amend the approved Fiscal Year 2015 Plan. The changes would be handled through the administrative update by staff to the Regional HUD Field Office.

Community Input

- Neighborhood & Business Services staff convened three planning sessions to receive input to the development of the Plan.
- A draft of the Fiscal Year 2015 Plan, in both English and Spanish, has been placed in several libraries throughout Mecklenburg County. A draft of the Plan was also placed at the Charlotte Housing Authority and the Old City Hall.

Next Steps

- The City Council will be asked to approve the Plan at the April 28, 2014, Council Business Meeting.
- The Plan will be submitted to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development on or before May 16, 2014.

15. Public Hearing for Post-Construction Controls Ordinance

Action: Conduct a public hearing on the revisions to the Post-Construction Controls Ordinance.

Committee Chair: John Autry

Staff Resource(s): Daryl Hammock, Engineering & Property Management

Explanation

- The Post-Construction Controls Ordinance (PCCO) has been in effect since July 1, 2008.
- Staff has determined that several redevelopment projects face substantial technical and economic challenges accommodating water quality measures on-site.
- In November 2011, the City Council approved the temporary expansion of the mitigation fee to redevelopment in all areas until April 30, 2014.
- The expansion of the mitigation fee provides additional flexibility and predictability, which may reduce compliance costs while enhancing the environment.
- The mitigation fees are used by staff to design and build water quality measures somewhere else in the watershed.
- Failing to extend the ordinance will result in the mitigation option only being available in Transit Corridors or Business Revitalization geography.
- The Storm Water Advisory Committee unanimously recommended extending the mitigation option at their November 2013 meeting.
- The City Council received a briefing on the proposed changes at the February 10th dinner briefing and referred the topic to the City Council Environment Committee for a recommendation.
- Recent state legislation requires unanimous City Council approval for ordinance changes.
- The proposed revisions to the PCCO will not impact the Storm Water budget or the general fund.
- The City Council will be asked to vote on the proposed revisions at the April 28, 2014, Council Business Meeting.

Environment Committee Recommendation

- At their April 2, 2014 meeting, the Environment Committee voted 4-1 (Autry, Driggs, Fallon, Howard voted yes; Smith voted no) to recommend extending, until October 31, 2014, the 2011 temporary expansion that allows certain redevelopment sites to pay a fee in-lieu-of onsite runoff control.
- During that time staff will analyze options to include developing a case-by-case decision process to determine availability of the fee for applicable redevelopment sites.
- Redevelopment sites located within Transit Corridors and Business Revitalization geographies will not be affected by any ordinance changes, and will continue to be allowed a fee-in-lieu option, in accordance with the original ordinance.

Next Steps

The City Council will be asked to approve the Environment Committee recommendation at its April 28, 2014, Council Business Meeting.

Explanation

- At the March 24th Council Business Meeting, staff briefed the City Council on the Intergovernmental Relations Committee's proposed 2014 State Legislative Agenda.
- The proposed 2014 State Legislative Agenda addresses proposals to:
 - Support the continuation of the film refundable tax credit program,
 - Support HB 375 increasing the maximum allowable length of Charlotte Area Transit System buses to 60 feet, and
 - Support reforms to the privilege license tax that are revenue neutral and provide for a reliable and growing source of revenue in the future.
- The North Carolina General Assembly convenes on May 14th for its 2014 "short" session.

Committee Action

At its March 3rd meeting, the Intergovernmental Relations Committee voted unanimously to approve the 2014 State Legislative Agenda.

Next Steps

The 2014 State Legislative Agenda will serve as the basis for advocacy before the 2014 General Assembly.

18. 2014 TIGER Program Grants

Action: A. Authorize the City Manager to submit applications to compete for funds from the fiscal year 2014 TIGER program, with the City of Charlotte as the lead agency, and

B. Adopt a resolution of support for the two projects.

Explanation

- Transportation Investments Generating Economic Recovery, also known as TIGER Discretionary Grants, are authorized and funded by the U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) for transportation infrastructure projects. Five previous rounds of TIGER grants were authorized in 2009, 2010, 2011, 2012 and 2013.
- On March 3, 2014, USDOT issued a Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) for the sixth round of TIGER Discretionary Grants, detailing the availability of \$600.0 million in competitive grants and announcing selection criteria. Up to \$35.0 million is available nationally for planning projects and up to \$445.0 million is available for capital projects in urban areas.
- The selection criteria listed in the NOFA are:
 - Primary Selection Criteria:
 - o State of Good Repair,
 - o Economic Competitiveness,
 - o Quality of Life,
 - o Environmental Sustainability, and
 - o Safety.
 - Secondary Selection Criteria:
 - o Innovation,
 - o Partnership.
- The minimum capital grant award is \$10.0 million, the maximum planning grant award is \$3.0 million, and the maximum for all grants awarded to any one state are \$120.0 million. Up to 80% of a project's total cost can be funded by a TIGER grant.

Applications/Proposals

- USDOT has established a very aggressive schedule for submitting applications. Final applications must be submitted by April 28, 2014.
- Staff proposes to submit one capital grant and endorse one planning grant being submitted by the Centralina Council of Governments (COG).

Transit Fare System Capital Grant (project cost \$13.5 million)

- The Transit Fare System Capital Project will replace the:
 - 16year-old bus fare collection equipment,
 - Seven year-old ticket vending machines (TVM) on the existing LYNX Blue Line to complement the TVM new technology being procured for the LYNX BLE,
 - Provide fare collection equipment on the Special Transit service, which currently has no fare collection equipment.

- The new systems will be capable of issuing and accepting smart cards and magnetic fare media, accepting mobile payment transactions as well as cash/debit/credit forms of payment.
- The new system is capable of regional integration and will allow for seamless transactions between neighboring systems like the Concord Kannapolis Area Transit System and the Charlotte Area Transit System.
- The new system will improve efficiency, reduce transaction costs, outages and maintenance costs and promote regional transit system compatibility along with environmental sustainability by the reuse of reloadable transaction media.
- The Metropolitan Transit Commission has been informed about the grant application and the Concord Kannapolis Area Transit System will provide a letter of support.

Greater Charlotte Bi-State Freight Mobility Plan (project cost \$300,000)

- The COG will submit a planning project to develop a regional forum for the analysis of freight issues and needs in the greater Charlotte region.
- The study will lead to specific recommendations and/or ordinance changes to improve freight planning, enhance public-private coordination, identify land use and regulatory needs and promote economic and workforce development through freight oriented development.
- The City Council is being asked to endorse this project and to provide 50% (\$30,000) of the project match. The remaining project match, of 50% (30,000), will be provided by the COG through other public and private sector contributions.
- The City Council is being asked to endorse this project and to provide a dollar for dollar match of other COG Member and private contributions up to \$30,000.

19. Centralina Council of Government Resolution of Support

Action:

A. Adopt a resolution in support of Centralina Council of Government's submission of a proposal to the U.S. Commerce Department seeking the Charlotte region's designation as a Manufacturing Community as defined by the Investing in Manufacturing Communities Partnership, and

B. Authorize the City Manager to execute a Memorandum of Understanding with Centralina Council of Governments for membership in the Global Charlotte Manufacturing Community Consortium.

Background

- The Centralina Council of Governments (CCOG) is a voluntary organization of municipal and county governments serving the greater Charlotte region.
- Formed in 1968, CCOG is one of 16 regional councils in North Carolina established by the General Assembly to meet the region's needs on a wide range of governance issues.
- CCOG serves a nine-county area including Anson, Cabarrus, Gaston, Lincoln, Iredell, Mecklenburg, Rowan, Stanly, and Union counties.
- In 2012, CCOG completed a Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy that identified Advanced Manufacturing as a distinctive competency of the Charlotte region supporting seven industry sectors: Financial Services, Logistics and Global Commerce, Aerospace and Defense, Automotive, Biomedical, Healthcare, and Energy.
- In September 2013, the U.S. Commerce Department, through the Economic Development Administration's (EDA) Investing in Manufacturing Communities Partnership (IMCP), awarded CCOG a \$200,000 grant to develop strategies to support Advanced Manufacturing in the Charlotte region.
- The grant has enabled CCOG to convene regional manufacturers, suppliers, educators, workforce boards, and economic developers to collaboratively develop and implement advanced manufacturing strategies. City staff has been participating in these efforts.
- CCOG is now seeking designation as an IMCP Manufacturing Community, which will be awarded to 12 communities nationwide. Designation confers the following exclusive benefits:
 - Consideration for selected federal funding streams offered through IMCP Participating Agencies, including the Commerce Department, Environmental Protection Agency, and the Small Business Administration;
 - A point of contact to help the Charlotte region access federal economic development funding and technical assistance;
 - Consideration for federal financial assistance through EDA Challenge Grant Awards; and
 - Opportunities to promote and recognize the Charlotte region as a Manufacturing Community, which may help attract investors and other partners.
- CCOG has requested a resolution of support from the City Council for the application seeking the Charlotte region's designation as an IMCP Manufacturing Community.

- Additionally, the EDA requires applicants seeking designation as an IMCP Manufacturing Community to convene a consortium of regional economic development partners to work collaboratively to support the growth of advanced manufacturing.
- Therefore, CCOG has requested the City sign a Memorandum of Understanding to become a member of the “Global Charlotte Manufacturing Community Consortium”.
- The following organizations or agencies are also members of the consortium:
 - Centralina Economic Development Commission,
 - Charlotte Regional Partnership,
 - Charlotte Regional Workforce Development Partners,
 - Charlotte Works,
 - Competitive Workforce Alliance,
 - The Regional Mayors Alliance, and
 - Charlotte Research Institute at UNC-Charlotte.
- The Memorandum of Understanding would be effective through June 30, 2016, and may be renewed by mutual written agreement among the parties.
- Should the Charlotte region be designated an IMCP Manufacturing Community, the City, through its membership in the consortium, would collaborate on any federal assistance opportunities that may be available.

20. LYNX Blue Line Extension Project – Civil Construction

Action: Award the low-bid contract of \$119,051,742.33 to The Lane Construction Corporation for the civil construction of Segment B/C of the LYNX Blue Line Extension project.

Explanation

- The civil construction work of the LYNX Blue Line Extension Segment B/C, which extends from north of the proposed Old Concord Road Station to the project terminus, on the campus of the University of North Carolina at Charlotte will include:
 - Drainage,
 - Erosion control,
 - Bridges,
 - Arterial roadways,
 - Retaining walls,
 - Traffic control,
 - Traffic signal,
 - Water main, and
 - Sewer installation and related works.
- On November 25, 2013, an Invitation to Bid was advertised.
 - The contract was advertised with one bid alternate to add disposal of non-hazardous contaminated soils anticipated for the project.

- Additionally, the contract was advertised with the provision of incentive payments if the contractor can complete three key milestones ahead of schedule; a total of \$1.0 million is potentially available and included in the award amount.
- A pre-bid conference was held on December 9, 2013, to solicit participation and to share information. On March 13, 2014, three bids were received.
- The Lane Construction Corporation was the lowest, responsive bidder and has been determined to be qualified and responsive to the local and federal requirements.
- Based on the favorable bid submitted by Lane Construction Corporation, the bid alternate was selected for inclusion in the contract and reflected in the award amount.
- The bid received is within the current budget of the LYNX Blue Line Extension project and does not change the anticipated cost of the project.
- The cost of this contract is estimated to be incurred over multiple years in compliance with the schedule as established in the contract.
- Funding for this contract will be provided by federal, state and half-cent sales tax revenue, along with short and long-term financing. The payment schedule will align with actual work performed and established contractual milestones.

Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE)

Established DBE Goal: 20.0%

Committed DBE Goal: 20.1%

Introduction to CONSENT

Consent consists of routine items that have been approved in the budget. Price lists for unit price contracts are available upon request.



In April 2013, the City Council voted to replace the City's Small Business Opportunity Program with the Charlotte Business INCLUSION program. On July 1, 2013, the City phased in the Charlotte Business INCLUSION program into all of its practices and procedures.

The Charlotte Business INCLUSION program seeks to promote diversity, inclusion, and local business opportunities in the City's contracting and procurement process for Minority, Women, and Small Business Enterprises (MWSBEs) headquartered in the Charlotte Combined Statistical Area. Participation of Minority, Women, or Small Business Enterprises (MBE, WBE, or SBE) is noted where applicable.

For a period of time during FY2014, projects appearing in the Council Agendas will incorporate Policy references for either the current Charlotte Business INCLUSION program or the Small Business Opportunity Program.

The applicable Charlotte Business INCLUSION program Policy or the Small Business Opportunity Program policy sections are referenced at the end of the Council Request for Council Action.

Disadvantaged Business Enterprise

Disadvantaged Business Enterprise is a federal program primarily used for Aviation and Transit.

Contractors and Consultants

All contractor and consultant selections follow the Council-approved process unless described otherwise. For the procurement of professional services and/or engineering, architectural, and surveying services, the North Carolina General Statutes 143-64.31 requires that units of government "select firms qualified to provide such services on the basis of demonstrated competence and qualification...without regard to fee other than unit price information, and therefore to negotiate a contract for those services at a fair and reasonable fee with the best qualified firm."

The property transaction process following the City Council approval for condemnation is referenced at the end of Consent.

24. Police Applicant Psychological Evaluation Services

 - B. Authorize the City Manager to negotiate two, one-year contract extensions contingent upon the company's satisfactory performance.**

Explanation

- One of the key components of the police officer application process is job-related, validated psychological testing and evaluations of applicants.
- The contract with The FMRT Group will provide psychological testing and evaluation of police applicants.
- The contract is for a term of three years and will include the following services:
 - Development of psychological evaluation procedures that measure an applicant's cognitive abilities, attitudes and behaviors, conscientiousness, demeanor, personality traits, and communication skills consistent with success in law enforcement careers,
 - Pre-employment online psychological testing of applicants,
 - Psychological testing of applicants continuing in the process by licensed psychologists,
 - Oral interview examinations of applicants who have received a conditional offer of employment, and
 - Timely reporting and interpretation of examination results.
- In May 2011, the Police Department entered into a one-year contract with The FRMT Group to conduct applicant psychological evaluations.
 - The contract amount fell below the \$100,000 City Council approval threshold.
 - There have been two, one-year contract extensions.
 - The FMRT Group has performed all of the tasks defined in the contract in a satisfactory manner.
- The contract with The FMRT Group is based on the number of psychological evaluations performed; on average, the Police Department will hire 100 new officers per year.
- The total expenditure of the contract is estimated at \$118,300 over the three-year term; the cost is based on providing services for approximately 100 applicants per year.
 - The rate for FY2015 is \$382 per applicant, the same rate in effect for FY2014.
 - In FY2016 and FY2017, the rate will be \$400.50 per applicant.

Charlotte Business INclusion

No SBE goal was set for this contract because there are no subcontracting opportunities (Part C: Section 2.1 (a) of the Charlotte Business INclusion Policy). The FRMT Group is, however, a City-certified SBE firm.

Action: Adopt a budget ordinance appropriating \$421,150 in assets forfeiture funds for the purchase of body cameras, rifles, and the salary and benefits for a Homicide Support Specialist.

Explanation

Federal and state law permits police agencies to use a share of the proceeds from seized drug assets for eligible law enforcement related projects.

Equipment

- The Police Department requests to use \$250,000 of funds to begin equipping officers with body cameras.
- The body cameras will supplement the aging in-car camera system currently in use and will provide video of officer engagement during patrol, such as during routine traffic stops, for arrests, and calls for service involving weapons and suspicious persons and/or vehicles.
- The Police Department will need to participate in a Request for Proposal to determine the cost and quantity of cameras.
 - Staff will return to the City Council to request approval of a contract at a future date.
- For the first phase of the patrol rifle program, Police requests to use \$106,569 of funds to purchase 45 rifles and cover the costs of ammunition for training and on-duty use.
- Officers across the country are increasingly outgunned by violent criminals and a growing number of departments are providing rifles for their officers. The rifles enable patrol officers to engage or contain threats earlier and at a more advantageous distance than with their current weapons.
- Almost all active shooter attacks occur in public venues with open spaces and/or long, open hallways, which are currently beyond police's fielded weapons range.
 - In active shooter cases across the country, officers have used force to end the shootings 60% of the time when the incident is still ongoing upon their arrival.
 - Participating departments have credited fielding of patrol rifles as a key component of their ability to effectively handle such incidents.
- Specific to Charlotte, the Police Department has identified a need for officers to be better equipped in situations involving heavily armed suspects, such as active shooter scenarios, violent street crimes, and apprehension of violent criminals attempting to evade police.
- Currently officers only have pistols and shotguns, which is the same weapons configuration that has been in place for over 30 years.
- Over the last several years, the Police Department has seen an increase in the frequency of assault weapons. During 2013, the Police department tracked the following statistics for assault weapons:
 - More than 2,200 rifle round casings were recovered at crime scenes including shooting into occupied dwellings and other acts of violence.

- Approximately 58 cases identified a rifle as the primary weapon used by the suspect. These cases included homicides, robberies, aggravated assaults, and intimidation.
- Approximately 68 assault rifles were recovered including AK47s and SKS models.
- Six rifles will be deployed in each of four patrol divisions for a total of 24; 11 of the rifles will be used by the Violent Criminal Apprehension Unit and 10 rifles will be assigned to the Firearms Training Unit for training and replacements.

Homicide Support Specialist

- \$64,581 will fund the salary and benefits for the Administrative Officer assigned to Police's Homicide Support Unit.
- The duties of this position include:
 - Assisting the families of homicide victims with the victim compensation application process,
 - Co-facilitating support groups for families of homicide victims,
 - Coordinating volunteers in the Homicide Support Program, and
 - Connecting families of homicide victims with area community services.
- The position was initially funded through a federal grant, but the funding ended on June 30, 2012.
- For the remainder of Fiscal Year 2014 and annualized for Fiscal Year 2015, \$64,581 is required to fund the salary and benefits for the position.
 - \$10,198 will be allocated for the remainder of Fiscal Year 2014.
 - \$54,383 will be allocated for Fiscal Year 2015.

Explanation

- The project will include the renovation of 2,100 square-feet within the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police Department and formerly occupied Job Link space of the Sugar Creek Service Center Building located at 4045 North Tryon Street.
- The work includes renovating interior office space, an additional restroom, and code-required firewall for tenant separation.
- On February 19, 2014, an Invitation to Bid was advertised; six bids were received.

- The project incorporated sustainable elements such as low-flow water fixtures, occupancy light sensors, recycled content carpeting, and finishes with low or no volatile organic compounds.
- Funding for this project is proposed from the General Community Investment Plan from budgeted facility renovation and maintenance funds (\$100,000), and remaining balances in the completed Steele Creek Police Division Station construction project (\$72,186.48), and in the Police Department's Fiscal Year 2014 operating budget from building maintenance funds (\$27,745.93).
- Construction completion is scheduled for fourth quarter 2014.

Background

- The Sugar Creek Service Center currently houses the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Library and Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police Department.
- Job Link vacated the Sugar Creek Service Center Building in June 2012.
- Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police Department currently occupies approximately 7,600 square-feet of the building in addition to shared common space with the Library.
- A typical Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police Department division station is 12,500 square-feet.
- By occupying the former Job Link space, the Police Department will increase their space allocation to approximately 9,600 square-feet in addition to the shared common space.
- The Operation and Maintenance Agreement with Mecklenburg County, dated February 2002, will be amended to reflect the change of use within the building.

Charlotte Business INclusion

Construction contracts estimated to be less than \$300,000 are considered informal; therefore, an SBE goal was not established (Part A: Section 3.1 of the Charlotte Business INclusion Policy). D.E. Brown Construction, however, committed 14.78% (\$29,544) of the total contract amount to the following SBE firms: Millennium Electric Services, Inc. Explanation

- The Joint Communications Center will be constructed at 1315 North Graham Street and is planned to provide space for the following:
 - The Fire Department, the Police Department, and Medic 911 Dispatch,
 - Emergency Operation Center,
 - CharMeck 311 Call Center,
 - Police Real Time Crime Center,
 - Traffic Signals section, Charlotte Department of Transportation,
 - Communication Division, Mecklenburg County Sherriff's Department, and
 - City Data Center.
- The facility is designed to handle day-to-day emergency operations and serve as a central hub for disaster management.
- It will contain approximately 75,000 to 85,000 square feet on four floors and accommodate approximately 460 staff members by the year 2030.
- In accordance with North Carolina General Statutes, a Construction Manager at Risk may be used to provide pre-construction services during the design phase and to later construct the project with a guaranteed maximum price.
- Prior to construction, the City Council will be asked to award a separate contract with Rodgers Leeper I for the construction value and establishing the guaranteed maximum price.
- The Joint Venture was selected using the Council-approved, qualifications-based selection process. On December 17, 2013, a Request for Qualifications was advertised; seven proposals were received and the evaluation committee, consisting of City staff, interviewed three firms.
- The evaluation committee selected Rodgers Leeper I based on a combination of experience and needs, specifically in the areas of:
 - Overall team strength,
 - Experience with communication centers,
 - Approach to pre-construction services, and
 - Charlotte Business INClusion (CBI) Participation Plan.
- The Construction Manager at Risk pre-construction services includes:
 - Scheduling,
 - Estimating,
 - Cost control services,
 - Constructability, and
 - Assisting the City in setting CBI goals.
- On June 10, 2013, the City Council approved the Fiscal Year 2014-2018 Community Investment Plan, including \$68.0 million in Certificates of Participation for the Joint Communications Center.

31. Ashley Farm Pond Water Quality Enhancement Project

Action: Award the low-bid contract of \$668,120 to Blythe Development Co. for the Ashley Farm Pond Water Quality Enhancement project.

Policy

Pond projects are implemented in accordance with the Council-approved Pond and Dam Rehabilitation Policy, aimed at protecting as many existing ponds as possible prior to removal by private development or structural failure, and to use these ponds as a highly cost-effective tool to achieve water quality and flood control goals.

Explanation

- Ashley Farm Pond is a one-acre pond located south of Margaret Wallace Road in the Ashley Farm subdivision, just east of Rheinwood Court and Ashley Farm Drive.

- The pond is located in the McAlpine Creek watershed and improves polluted runoff from approximately 83 acres of developed land.
- Ashley Farm Pond drains to a tributary of McAlpine Creek, which is considered impaired by Clean Water Act standards.
- Pond improvements will include replacement of the existing dam embankment and the construction of a storm drainage flow control structure.
- These enhancements will improve the quality of water moving through the pond before the water discharges into the creek.
- Improving existing ponds is a cost-effective means of improving water quality, averaging one-fifth the cost of creating new water quality measures that provide equivalent environmental benefit.
- On February 26, 2014, an Invitation to Bid was advertised; four bids were received.
- Construction is expected to be complete second quarter 2015.

Action: Approve change order #1 with Ferebee Corporation in the amount of \$396,871.65 for the Shillington Place Storm Drainage Improvement project.

Explanation

- The Shillington Place Storm Drainage Improvement project will reduce flooding and erosion within the 480-acre project area. The project is roughly bounded by Smithfield Church Road, Sharon Road, Park Road, and Sharon Acres Road.
- The contract is based on unit prices and the change order will provide funds for some items exceeding original projected quantities.
- Change order #1 will provide funds to accommodate the following:

Explanation

- Charlotte-Mecklenburg Storm Water Services and the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Utility Department are expediting planned work in preparation for Phase 2 of the Gold Line.
- Contract amendment #2 will provide funding for design and construction administration services for the drainage improvements along Trade Street from Brevard Street to Beatties Ford Road, along Beatties Ford Road from Trade Street to Johnson C. Smith University, and along Hawthorne Lane from 5th Street to Sunnyside Avenue.
- The contract amendment will also provide funding for water and sewer improvements that will serve to increase hydraulic efficiency and redundancy as well as replace short sections of dated water and sewer lines along Trade Street, Beatties Ford Road, and Hawthorne Lane.
- On July 26, 2010, the City Council authorized the City Manager to approve an agreement with URS Corporation – North Carolina (URS) for the evaluation and design of the storm drainage system along the Trade Street Corridor.
- On May 3, 2011, the City Manager approved the original contract with URS, in the amount of \$611,500, to provide engineering services for the planning and design phase of the drainage systems for Phase 1 of the Gold Line.
- On October 24, 2012, contract amendment #1 was approved by the Storm Water Services Division Manager for a minor administrative change - no funds were added in the contract.
- The total contract amount including the contract amendment is \$1,461,500.
- URS Corporation – North Carolina provided expedited services for Phase 1; and their performance, expertise, and history with the project will aid in completing Phase 2 more efficiently, which is approximately double the length of Phase 1.

- Storm Water Services uses contract engineering firms on new storm drainage improvement projects that are the highest ranking projects in the program backlog each year.
- The projects may include storm drainage improvements that reduce house and street flooding, repair failing infrastructure, or enhance water quality of nearby creeks.
- On June 20, 2013, a Request for Qualifications was advertised; 27 proposals were received and 10 firms were selected using the Council-approved, qualifications-based selection process.
 - Staff informed the 10 firms that projects would be assigned over the next two years.
 - The City awarded three contracts on January 13, 2014.
- The use of consultants allows specific expertise to be matched to the appropriate projects on a task-order basis.
- Work will include, but is not limited to:
 - Evaluation,
 - Analysis and recommendations for repair and/or improvement,
 - Design of repairs and/or improvements,
 - Preparation of construction documents,
 - Environmental assessments, and
 - Construction oversight and monitoring.
- When consultants perform quality engineering analysis, the most efficient method is for that firm to complete the design and provide construction administration services.
- Amendments to the contract may be needed for completion of multiple projects.
- The first project to be initiated under this contract will be the design and construction administration phase of the Tattersall Storm Drainage Improvement project.
- The Tattersall project drainage area is approximately 130 acres and bordered by Merrywood Road and Seth Thomas Road to the north, Park Road to the east, Quail Hill Road to the south, and Wittstock Drive to the west.

Cooperative Purchasing Exemption

NC S.L. 2001-328, effective January 1, 2002, authorizes competitive group purchasing.

Explanation

- Utility heavy duty trucks are used for daily construction crews to haul materials and equipment to and from work sites to support repair work on water and sewer systems.
- The Utility Department currently has four dump trucks, which have reached the end of their useful life and were approved on the FY2014 Capital Equipment Replacement List.
- The cab-chassis and body will be combined as heavy duty trucks.
 - Four dump truck bodies will be purchased from the North Carolina state contract at a total price of \$49,968.
 - The two remaining truck bodies are part of an Invitation to Bid currently being solicited by the Procurement Management division of Shared Services. The bodies are neither available on the North Carolina state contract nor cooperative purchasing alliances contract.
- Santex Truck Center has a contract awarded through the Houston-Galveston Area Council that offers competitively obtained contracts to public agencies nationwide.

Action: Award a low-bid contract of \$192,452.50 to Carolina Cajun Concrete, Inc. for construction of the Rolling Stone Avenue roadway repair project.

Staff Resource(s): Barry Shearin, Utility

Explanation

- On January 16, 2014, a six-inch diameter water line ruptured on Rolling Stone Avenue. Water from the ruptured pipe flowed under the road surface, causing significant deterioration for about 600 feet and eventual failure of the pavement.
- Charlotte-Mecklenburg Utility Department crews responded to repair the main, fill the deterioration, and temporarily stabilize the roadbed; permanent repairs are pending.
 - The asphalt must be removed from the entire width of the roadway, and replaced for a distance of about 600 feet.
 - Portions of the soil underneath the roadway, damaged by the flowing water, must be replaced.
- Repairs will take approximately eight weeks to complete.
- Utility staff has communicated to residents about the timing and complexity of the street repair.

Charlotte Business INclusion

Construction contracts estimated to be less than \$300,000 are considered informal; therefore, a SBE goal was not established (Part A: Section 3.1 of the Charlotte Business INclusion Policy). Carolina Cajun is, however, a certified SBE firm.

39. Harding Place Water and Sanitary Sewer Service Connections

Action: Award the low-bid contract of \$123,682.50 to State Utility Contractors, Inc. for the construction and installation of new water and sewer services to serve The Crescent Dilworth Apartment Building.

Explanation

- The contract is for construction of water and sewer service connections for a new apartment complex, The Crescent Dilworth Apartment Building, located at the corner of East Morehead Street and Harding Place, near the uptown area.
- A total of five new service connections (three water and two sewer) are required to provide water, sewer, irrigation, and fire protection services to the apartment complex.
- The cost of these taps will be paid for by the developer and is based on the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Utility Department policy for commercial water and sewer taps.
- On February 26, 2014, an Invitation to Bid was advertised; two bids were received.

Construction contracts estimated to be less than \$300,000 are considered informal; therefore, an SBE goal was not established (Part A: Section 3.1 of the Charlotte Business INclusion Policy).

40. Wastewater PCB Decontamination Contract Amendments

Action: Approve contract amendments with the following firms:

- Soils & Materials Engineering, \$75,000,
- Carolina Environmental Response Team, Inc., \$200,000, and
- Pace Analytical, \$250,000.

Staff Resource(s): Barry Shearin, Utility

Explanation

- On February 6, 2014, wastes containing polychlorinated biphenyl (PCB) and trichlorobenzene were illegally discharged to the sewage collection system that flows to the Mallard Creek Wastewater Treatment Plant.
- Since the incident, staff has determined that contaminated waste containing PCB was also illegally discharged to the McAlpine sewer collection system.
- The City is coordinating the cleanup response with the federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). These contract amendments will ensure compliance with EPA regulatory requirements.
- The firms listed in the action box currently have contracts with the City and have provided equipment, manpower, or professional services for the initial contamination response in February.
- The types of equipment and services requested by the City were included in the original scopes of the contracts, but the high costs associated with this type of contamination response was not anticipated when the contracts were originally awarded.
- The contract with Soils & Materials Engineering is for professional services relating to environmental engineering and environmental testing.
 - The original contract was approved by the City Council on February 14, 2011, for the amount of \$75,000, and allowed for two renewals. Both renewals have been previously executed and this request is for an additional amendment on the last renewal for the emergency response work.
- The contract with Carolina Environmental Response Team is for providing emergency response to contamination events including handling wastes, decontaminating equipment and facilities, and documenting the work.
 - The original contract was an informal contract for \$90,000. Since this emergency response was much greater than any scope of work contemplated at the time of award, the contract amendment will approve payment for services already provided and those expected over the next few months to complete the cleanup.
- The contract with Pace is for laboratory services including PCB testing of solids materials like soil and sludge.
 - The contract was approved by the City Council on July 22, 2013, for an estimated amount of \$130,000.

- Provided in the chart below is the original contract amount, requested contract amendment, and new total contract amount.

Sole Source Exemption

- G.S. 143-129 (e) (6) provides that formal bidding requirements do not apply when:
 - Performance or price competition are not available;
 - A needed product is available from only one source or supply; or
 - Standardization or compatibility is the overriding consideration.
- Sole sourcing is necessary for this purchase because Horizon Technology, Inc. is the sole manufacturer and supplier of testing supplies used by Charlotte-Mecklenburg Utility Department Laboratory Services for polychlorinated biphenyl (PCB), oil & grease, and pesticides analysis.
- The City Council must approve purchases made under the sole source exception.

Explanation

- The Laboratory Services of Charlotte-Mecklenburg Utility Department conducts thousands of water quality tests per year monitoring chemicals, oil and grease, and pesticides concentrations to protect the City's sanitary sewer system and the environment.
- The Laboratory's regulatory certification requires staff to use a specific set of proprietary laboratory testing supplies from Horizon Technology, Inc. to fulfill these analytical responsibilities for PCB, oil and grease, and pesticides concentrations.
- The recent dumping of PCB into the sanitary sewer system requires an expanded scope of testing and an unanticipated increase in necessary testing supplies.

- Horizon Technology, Inc. gives the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Utility Department volume based discounts.
- The first year’s expenditure includes replacement of one aging piece of equipment included in the FY2014 Capital Equipment Replacement List.
- Annual expenditures under this action are estimated to be as follows:

- Control system software has been standardized within the department and is used in all treatment plants and select wastewater lift stations.
- To ensure continuity of operations, the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Utility Department seeks to maintain vendor maintenance for the controls system application, and software maintenance services that includes telephone support and software patches.
- The control system application vendor defines the provider of the software maintenance services.
- The contract includes one-year of software maintenance services and five, one-year contract renewals. The average annual increase is between 6% and 9%.

Charlotte Business INClusion

No SBE goal was set for this contract because there are no subcontracting opportunities (Part C: Section 2.1 (a) of the Charlotte Business INClusion Policy).

43. Aircraft Hangar License

Action: Approve a five-year license with SPX Corporation for an exclusive aircraft hangar in the amount of \$1,855,957.

Explanation

- The SPX Corporation License incorporates an office addition of 6,000 square feet to be constructed to an existing hangar where SPX currently has aircraft.
- On March 24, 2014, the City Council awarded the low-bid contract, in the amount of \$1,770,055, to Quinn Sales dba Custom Building Systems for renovations and addition to a corporate hanger.
- The Aviation Department has been leasing the hangar to SPX for its aircraft only since April 2011.
- SPX Corporation will remit rent in the amount of \$30,932.61 monthly for 60-months for the exclusive use of the hangar and new office addition.
- The value of the total 60-month license is \$1,855,957.

44. Airport Maintenance Contract for Parking Systems

Action: A. Approve contract in the amount of \$454,008 with Scheidt & Bachmann USA, Inc. for extended maintenance support services for the Airport's parking revenue control and ground transportation management systems for a term of 14-months, and

B. Authorize the City Manager to approve four, one-year extensions of the maintenance contract in accordance with the fee schedule set forth in the maintenance contract.

Staff Resource(s): Brent Cagle, Aviation

Explanation

- On September 27, 2010, the City Council approved a contract with Scheidt & Bachmann, in the amount of \$4,692,904, for the installation of a parking revenue control system and ground transportation management system at the Airport.
- The parking revenue control system automates the operations and management of the numerous parking facilities located at the Airport.
- The ground transportation management system manages the commercial vehicle operations at the Airport, including taxicabs and other types of vehicle operators.
- Both systems include a variety of proprietary and commercial off-the-shelf software and hardware that will require ongoing maintenance and monitoring to ensure uninterrupted service.
- The systems are presently maintained under a warranty provided by Scheidt & Bachmann that expires on April 30, 2014. This contract will establish a maintenance program with Schiedt & Bachmann for continued support of the systems following expiration of the warranty.
- The maintenance contract will be for an initial term of 14-months at a total cost of \$454,008. The contract amount is allocated as follows:
 - \$64,493 for May 1, 2014 through June 30, 2014, and
 - \$389,515 for July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015.

- The maintenance contract contains four, one-year extensions exercisable by the City Manager in accordance with the following fee schedule:
 - Year 2 - \$412,051
 - Year 3 - \$429,926
 - Year 4 - \$452,974
 - Year 5 - \$476,996

- The Aviation Department has determined it is necessary to also undertake terminal capacity planning to maintain facilities that will support such growth.
- Contract amendment #1 will allow simultaneous completion of the airfield plan and terminal capacity enhancement plan.
- The new total value of the contract, to include the contract amendment, is \$3,197,660.

All additional work involved in this change order will be performed by Landrum & Brown, Inc. and its existing sub consultants. - The system has been very successful in tracking and documenting the project budget, schedule and costs. Prior to system implementation, these were manual tasks, which were time consuming and not exact.
- The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) has reviewed the use of the system for the LYNX Blue Line Extension project (BLE) and has authorized using the system for other FTA-funded projects.
- The success of the system of the BLE project and the use of the system for project controls requires additional access for project staff and contractors.
- E-Builder has agreed to maintain 2012 pricing providing an opportunity to acquire the maximum licenses available for the system, which will allow for unlimited additional licenses over a three-year period. The contract will also provide the option for an additional year with up to 100 licenses.
- E-Builder has an active General Services Administration contract for the E-Builder product and is willing to extend the same pricing, terms and conditions to the City.

Federal Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Opportunity

No DBE goal was set for this contract because there are no participation opportunities.

47. Transit Buses and Related Equipment

Action: Award unit price contracts to Gillig Corporation and Motor Coach Industries for the purchase of 40, 45, and 30-foot low floor and coach diesel, and diesel/electric hybrid buses and related equipment.

Staff Resource(s): Larry Kopf, Transit

Explanation

- The Charlotte Area Transit System has 316 buses in its fixed-route bus fleet.
 - A portion of the Transit bus fleet must be replaced each year.
 - Buses are typically maintained for at least 12-years, and acquire approximately 500,000 miles.
 - Replacing old buses is cost effective and allows Transit to provide reliable service to the community.
- On August 27, 2007, the City Council approved a five-year contract with Gillig Corporation with a year one estimate of \$7,274,000 for the purchase of buses.
 - The majority of buses in the fixed-route fleet are currently Gillig buses; but 10 are Motor Coach Industries buses.
 - The Motor Coach Industries buses are over-the-road style buses that are used primarily on Transit's longer express routes.
 - The Motor Coach Industries buses were purchased in 2001 and are nearing the end of their useful life.
- The new contract includes five different types of diesel buses scheduled for purchase over the next five years.
 - The Gillig Corporation would supply the low-floor and the suburban models as outlined below:
 - Diesel-powered, 30-foot low floor; base price \$445,887,
 - Diesel-powered, 40-foot low floor; base price \$458,137, and
 - Diesel-powered, 40-foot suburban; base price \$463,337.
 - Motor Coach Industries would supply the over-the-road bus types as outlined below:
 - Diesel-powered, 45-foot over-the-road coach; base price \$618,383
 - Diesel-powered, 40-foot over-the-road coach; base price \$614,383
- The Gillig contract will include options for hybrid electric buses; however, Transit typically will purchase hybrid electric buses when environmental and/or energy grants are available.
- Hybrid electric buses are up to 30% more fuel-efficient and can reduce particulate matter from emissions by 95%.
- The cost of the diesel/electric-powered hybrid buses are:
 - Diesel/electric-powered hybrid, 40-foot low floor; base price \$656,237, and
 - Diesel/electric-powered hybrid, 30-foot low floor; base price \$643,987
- On June 17, 2013, Transit issued a Request for Proposal (RFP).
 - The RFP evaluation criteria included, in order of importance:
 - Product design and performance,
 - Manufacturer's performance and capabilities,
 - Total cost per bus, and
 - The delivery schedule.
- On November 4, 2013, Transit received three proposals.
 - All three firms were deemed to be within the competitive range and were invited to deliver a best and final offer.

- Based on the vendor proposals and information provided, the Transit evaluation committee recommends the City award a contract to Gillig Corporation and Motor Coach Industries.
- The first year order will include 11 buses totaling \$4,995,500. Subsequent orders will be based on FTA apportionments, the Transit Fleet Plan and any price adjustments (capped at 4% in the contract).
- The cost of this contract is estimated to be incurred over multiple years in compliance with the schedule as established in the contract.
- Funding for this contract will be provided by federal, state and half-cent sales tax revenue.
- The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics Producer Price Index Category 1413 "Trucks and Bus Bodies" capped at 4% will be used for any price adjustments for contract years two through five.

Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Opportunity

Gillig Corporation and Motor Coach Industries are both in compliance with the Federal Transit Administration's (FTA) regulation 49 CFR Part 26.45, which requires DBE certifications from Transit Vehicle Manufacturers as a condition of being authorized to bid on transit procurements funded by FTA.

Explanation

- The contract with Ernst & Young Infrastructure Advisors, LLC is an open contract not to exceed a total amount of \$2.5 million.
- The consultant's services will be authorized by task order (setting schedule, payment, and costs) as required to progress individual projects or funding opportunities.
- Tasks will include industry/project specific cash flow forecasting, sensitivity analysis, business planning, capital and operating budget analysis, credit analysis, and due diligence on major Transit capital projects.
- Scope includes, but is not limited to, work on:
 - The LYNX Blue Line Extension project,
 - The Blue Line Capacity Enhancement project,
 - The Red, Silver, and CityLYNX Gold line projects,
 - Applications and negotiations for federal grant and financing opportunities,
 - Revisions to the 2030 Plan as necessary and directed by Transit,
 - Conceptual, corridor specific planning, and
 - Innovative revenue forecasting and financial planning for other projects as directed by Transit.
- The cost for each task (project) will be funded by the specific project budget; therefore, the contract will be funded from several sources of grant revenue, the

- half-cent sales and use tax, and City funds.
- Federal and state funding opportunities require increasingly complex and comprehensive planning and processes, necessitating the need for use of professional financial advisors having expertise in the specific areas of transit grants, project delivery, and financing processes.
 - The Metropolitan Transit Commission continues to support the vision of the 2030 Transit Plan and has directed the Transit Department to advance the plan incorporating innovative funding, financing, and project delivery strategies.
 - The consultant will advise and assist the Transit Department on Public-Private Partnerships, federal financing opportunities including grants and Transportation Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (TIFIA) loans, and any other funding mechanisms that may become available for projects to advance the 2030 Transit Plan.

Selection Process

- On January 3, 2014, Transit advertised this opportunity publicly, soliciting offers from firms nationwide. On February 28, 2014, Transit received three offers for consideration.
- An evaluation team, consisting of City staff from the Budget & Evaluation, Finance, and Transit Departments, selected Ernst & Young Infrastructure Advisors, LLC as the most qualified firm.

Federal Contract Exemption

G.S. 143-129(e)(9a) allows local governments to purchase from contracts established by the United States government, including any federal agency, if the contractor is willing to extend the same or more favorable prices, terms, and conditions as those established under the federal contract.

Explanation

- The Transit Department records the radio and telephone conversations between Transit Vehicle Operators, Maintenance Technicians, Safety and Security staff, and Operation Centers.
- Since implementation in the late 1990's, the original equipment manufacturer merged with other recording solution providers, and the equipment has become obsolete.
- Transit will replace the current recording hardware, archive server, and end-user interface for reviewing audio recordings.
- The equipment maintains recordings per retention policy and law.
- The replacement system for bus service will be an extension of the existing system now in use by light rail service.
- The main federal contract was awarded on May 5, 2009, for a term of five years.
- Carolina Recording Devices, Inc. is willing to provide radio and phone recording equipment to the City at the same or better terms as are provided in its contract with the GSA.
- Total expenditure under the contract is estimated to be \$155,000.

Charlotte Business INclusion

- The Arts & Science Council is interested in using a portion of its 2012 National Endowment for the Arts "Our Town Grant" to commission and install a temporary painting at the North Tryon Street/Interstate-277 underpass, which is a North Carolina Department of Transportation (NCDOT) right-of-way.
- Per NCDOT policy, a City Council resolution is required to proceed with an encroachment agreement between the City and NCDOT to install the public art.
- The City's Public Art Guidelines outline the process for privately commissioned artwork to be placed in the public right-of-way. This is a privately commissioned, temporary art installation.
- The Arts & Science Council will fund all project costs; the piece is intended to be a temporary display that will help build excitement about the upcoming North Tryon Business Corridor enhancements.
- The installation will be removed in six to eight years when NCDOT repaints the underpass as a part of routine maintenance.
- Since the North Tryon Street/Interstate-277 underpass is located within NCDOT right-of-way, City staff and Arts & Science representatives have communicated with NCDOT staff on the installation of public art at this location.
- The Public Art Commission formally approved the proposed temporary installation on March 18, 2014.
- The underpass at North Tryon Street/Interstate-277 is the fourth project in Charlotte that falls under the "North Carolina Public Art on the Right-of-Way Policy," which was adopted by NCDOT in December 2010.

Part A: Administration & Enforcement

Appendix Section 18: Contract: For the purposes of establishing an SBE subcontracting goal on a Contract, the following are examples of contract types:

- Any agreement through which the City procures services from a Business Enterprise, other than Exempt Contracts.
- Contracts include agreements and purchase orders for (a) construction, re-construction, alteration and remodeling; (b) architectural work, engineering, testing, construction management and other professional services related to construction; and (c) services of any nature (including but not limited to general consulting and technology-related services).
- Contracts do not include agreements or purchase orders for the purchase or lease of apparatus, supplies, goods or equipment.
- The term "Contract" shall also include Exempt Contracts for which an SBE Goal has been set.
- Financial Partner Agreements, Development Agreements, and Construction Manager-at-Risk Agreements shall also be deemed "Contracts," but shall be subject to the provisions referenced in the respective Parts of the SBO Program Policy.

Appendix Section 23: Exempt Contracts: Contracts that fall within one or more of the following categories shall be "Exempt Contracts" for the purposes of establishing an SBE subcontracting goal, unless the Department responsible for procuring the Contract decides otherwise:

23.1. Informal Contracts. Informal Contracts shall be Exempt Contracts. (See Appendix Section 29 for a definition of Informal Contracts)

23.2. No Competitive Process Contracts: Contracts or purchase orders that are entered into without a competitive process, or entered into based on a competitive process administered by an entity other than the City shall be Exempt Contracts, including but not limited to contracts that are entered into by sole sourcing, piggybacking, buying off the North Carolina State contract, buying from a competitive bidding group purchasing program as allowed under G.S. 143-129(e)(3), or using the emergency procurement procedures established by the North Carolina General Statutes.

23.3. Managed Competition Contracts: Managed competition contracts pursuant to which a City Department or division competes with Business Enterprises to perform a City function shall be Exempt Contracts.

23.4. Real Estate Leasing and Acquisition Contracts: Contracts for the acquisition or lease of real estate shall be Exempt Contracts.

23.5. Federal Contracts Subject to DBE Requirements: Contracts that are subject to the U.S. Department of Transportation Disadvantaged Business Enterprise

Program as set forth in 49 CFR Part 26 or any successor legislation shall be Exempt Contracts.

23.6. State Contracts Subject to MWBE Requirements: Contracts for which a minority and women business participation goal is set pursuant to G.S. 143-128.2(a) due to a building project receiving funding from the State of North Carolina shall be Exempt Contracts.

23.7. Financial Partner Agreements with DBE or MWBE Requirements: Contracts that are subject to a disadvantaged business development program or minority and women business development program maintained by a Financial Partner shall be Exempt Contracts.

23.8. Interlocal Agreements: Contracts with other units of federal, state or local government shall be Exempt Contracts.

23.9. Contracts for Legal Services: Contracts for legal services shall be Exempt Contracts, unless otherwise indicated by the City Attorney.

23.10. Contracts with Waivers: Contracts for which the SBO Program Manager or the City Manager waives the SBO Program requirements shall be Exempt Contracts (such as when there are no SBE subcontracting opportunities on a Contract).

23.11. Special Exemptions: Contracts where the Department and the Program Manager agree that the Department had no discretion to hire an SBE (e.g., emergency contracts or contracts for banking or insurance services) shall be Exempt Contracts.

Appendix Section 29: Informal Contracts: Contracts and purchase orders through which the City procures services from a Business Enterprise that fall within one of the following two categories:

29.1. Construction Contracts Less Than or Equal To \$200,000: Contracts for construction or repair work that are estimated to require a total expenditure of City funds less than or equal to \$200,000.

29.2. Service Contracts That Are Less Than or Equal To \$100,000: Service Contracts that are estimated to require a total expenditure of City funds less than or equal to \$100,000.

Part B: Formal Construction Bidding

Part B: Section 2.1: When the City Solicitation Documents for a Construction Contract contain an SBE Goal, each Bidder must either: (a) meet the SBE Goal, or (b) comply with the Good Faith Negotiation and Good Faith Efforts requirements. Failure to do so constitutes grounds for rejection of the Bid. The City Solicitation Documents will contain certain forms that Bidders must complete to document having met these requirements.

Part B: Section 2.4: No SBE Goal When There Are No SBE Subcontracting Opportunities. The City shall not establish an SBE Goal for Construction Contracts where there are no SBEs certified to perform the scopes of work that the City regards as realistic opportunities for subcontracting.

Part C: Services Procurement

Part C: Section 2.2: When the City Solicitation Documents for a Service Contract do not contain an SBE Goal, each Proposer must negotiate in good faith with each SBE that responds to the Proposer's solicitations and each SBE that contacts the Proposer on its own accord. Additionally, the City may negotiate a Committed SBE Goal with the successful Proposer after the Proposal Opening.

Part C: Section 2.4: No SBE Goal When There Are No SBE Subcontracting Opportunities. The City shall not establish an SBE Goal for Service Contracts where there are no SBEs certified to perform the scopes of work that the City regards as realistic opportunities for subcontracting.

Part D: Post Contract Award Requirements

Part D: Section 6: New Subcontractor Opportunities/Additions to Scope, Contract Amendments

If a Contractor elects to subcontract any portion of a Contract that the Contractor did not previously identify to the City as a subcontracting opportunity, or if the scope of work on a Contract increases for any reason in a manner that creates a new SBE subcontracting opportunity, the City shall either:

- notify the Contractor that there will be no Supplemental SBE Goal for the new work; or
- establish and notify the Contractor of a Supplemental SBE Goal for the new work.

56. Reference – Property Transaction Process

Property Transaction Process Following Council Approval for Condemnation

The following overview is intended to provide further explanation for the process of property transactions that are approved by City Council for condemnation.

Approximately six weeks of preparatory work is required before the condemnation lawsuit is filed. During this time, City staff continues to negotiate with the property owner in an effort to reach a mutual settlement.

- If a settlement is reached, the condemnation process is stopped and the property transaction proceeds to a real estate closing.
- If a settlement cannot be reached, the condemnation lawsuit is filed. Even after filing, negotiations continue between the property owner and the City's legal representative. Filing of the condemnation documents allows:
 - The City to gain access and title to the subject property so the capital project can proceed on schedule.
 - The City to deposit the appraised value of the property in an escrow account with the Clerk of Court. These funds may be withdrawn by the property owner immediately upon filing, and at any time thereafter, with the understanding that additional funds transfer may be required at the time of final settlement or at the conclusion of litigation.
- If a condemnation lawsuit is filed, the final trial may not occur for 18 to 24 months; however, a vast majority of the cases settle prior to final trial. The City's condemnation attorney remains actively engaged with the property owner to continue negotiations throughout litigation.
 - North Carolina law requires that all condemnation cases go through formal non-binding mediation, at which an independent certified mediator attempts to facilitate a successful settlement. For the minority of cases that do not settle, the property owner has the right to a trial by judge or jury in order to determine the amount of compensation the property owner will receive.

ZONING COMMITTEE DISCUSSION

Staff presented this item to the Committee, noting that a recommendation of denial (4-2 vote) was rendered at the February 4th meeting. The City Council referred the petition back to the Zoning Committee for reconsideration at the request of the petitioner. Staff stated that the modifications to the site plan related to the portion of the development facing Marshall Place. Modifications included eliminating two units and breaking up the massing by creating two triplexes with open space as separation. Staff stated that the petitioner provided a new elevation of the triplex. Staff noted that this petition is inconsistent with the *Dilworth Land Use and Streetscape Plan* due to the density and that staff did not recommend approval of the petition.

A Commissioner stated that she thought the site plan discussed at the February meeting was appropriate in scale along Euclid Avenue and Ideal Way, but that she had concerns about the massing along Marshall Place relative to the single family residential neighborhood. The Commissioner stated that the updated site plan included modifications that break up the building massing, and the new site plan provides a better transition to the neighborhood along Marshall Place.

The Commissioner referenced an overlay provided by the petitioner of the proposed triplex on top of an existing home in the neighborhood, and noted the appropriateness with respect to scale. The Commissioner stated that she was comfortable with the changes made to the site plan. Another Commissioner show this graphic to other Committee members to view. (Note: This graphic is not part of the official submittal.)

Another Commissioner noted the surrounding conditions, specifically the site's transitional position at the edge of a station area. A Commissioner inquired about the density recommendation and land use, and staff responded that the *Dilworth Land Use and Streetscape Plan* recommends up to five residential units per acre and that the previously approved site plan supports that density.

There was no further discussion of the petition.

STAFF OPINION

ZONING COMMITTEE DISCUSSION

Staff presented this item and stated all outstanding issues were addressed. Staff mentioned a new modification to the site plan since the public hearing, increasing the side yard along the northern property line from five feet to ten feet. Staff stated that the rezoning request is inconsistent with the adopted Plan. Ideal Way Development Standards

General Provisions.

- The Petitioner acknowledges that other standard development requirements imposed by other city ordinances, such as those that regulate streets, sidewalks, trees, bicycle parking, and site development, may apply to the development of this site. These are not zoning regulations, are not administered by the Zoning Administrator, and are not separate zoning conditions imposed by this site plan. Unless specifically noted in the conditions for this site plan, these other standard development requirements will be applied to the development of this site as defined by those other city ordinances.
- Throughout this Rezoning Petition, the terms "Owner", "Owners", "Petitioner" or "Petitioners," shall, with respect to the Site, be deemed to include the heirs, devisees, personal representatives, successors in interest and assignees of the owner or owners of the Site who may be involved in its development from time to time.

Purpose

The purpose of this Rezoning application is to provide for the development of a single family attached community. To achieve this purpose, the application seeks the rezoning of the site to the UR-2 (CD) district.

Permitted Uses

Uses allowed on the property included in this Petition will be residential single family attached dwelling units and related residential accessory uses as are permitted in the UR-2 district.

Transportation

- The site will have access via a driveways to Euclid Avenue and Marshall Place as generally identified on the concept plan for the site.
- Parking areas, including two parking spaces per unit in garages and on street parking, are generally indicated on the concept plan for the site.

Architectural Standards

The development of the site will be governed by the district regulations of the Zoning Ordinance for the UR-2 district and by the scale and character represented by the building elevations attached as part of the plan. The Petitioner has also provided typical elevation images of the buildings that represent the overall scale, character, and quality of the building proposed to be constructed on the site. The Petitioner reserves the right to make minor architectural changes to these building design but the overall design and construction character will be as illustrated. Each residential unit will be provided with a minimum of 400 square feet of private open space as generally depicted on the site plan and may be composed of a combination of landscape and hardscape elements. The Petitioner reserves the right to install ornamental fencing on the site for decoration and to aid in delineating the areas devoted to private open space. Any such fencing will not exceed 4 feet in height and will not be opaque. The buildings finished will include brick, stone and/or other masonry products and Hardy Plank or other similar durable siding materials. No vinyl will be used as siding material. No expanses of blank wall exceeding 20 feet in length will be permitted for the two end units that have a side along Euclid Avenue. The Petitioner will observe a 10' side yard on the east end of the site adjacent the existing single family home but reserves the right to reduce that yard to 5' if the adjoining property is rezoned to something other than a single family zoning district or if the adjacent property is used or developed for any non-residential use allowed in a single family district. This area will be landscaped with a privacy fence and landscaping.

GENERAL

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The City of Charlotte is submitting the FY2015 Annual Action Plan (Action Plan) as the fifth and final Program Year Action Plan of the 2011-2015 Consolidated Plan. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires that all jurisdictions receiving annual entitlements of formula grants submit annual action plans to report on the status of needs and outcomes expected to be achieved in the coming year.

In FY2015, the City of Charlotte expects to receive the following entitlement grants:

- Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)
- Housing Opportunities for People with AIDS (HOPWA)
- Emergency Solution Grant (ESG)
- HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME)

Each of the proposed activities and projects identified in this Action Plan are intended to principally benefit priority needs households - those households with incomes ranging from 0%-80% of the Area Median Income (AMI). These households include populations that have special needs, such as elderly, disabled, homeless and HIV/AIDS families and individuals. The activities and projects will also address the City's overall priorities identified in the 2011-2015 Plan, including:

- **Continued implementation of More Than Shelter, Charlotte-Mecklenburg's Ten-Year Plan to End and Prevent Homelessness** by creating new, supportive housing opportunities for homeless individuals and families, including those who are chronically homeless.
- **Increasing affordable rental housing for priority needs households**, particularly for extremely low-income (30% or less of AMI), very low-income (31-50% of AMI) households and special needs populations.

- **Revitalizing Neighborhoods:** The City's will continue targeting assistance in four Service Delivery areas that are closely aligned to the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police Service Delivery areas.
- **Revitalizing Distressed Business Corridors:** The City will continue to identify employment, and tax base improvement within the Business Corridor Geography with increased Facade matching grant assistance to apartment properties, and a special focus on identifying a Public/Private Partnership to redevelop the Eastland Mall. In addition, a developer proposal has been submitted for the Bojangles Arena for a sports facility and adjacent development, which includes a hotel. The City has acquired nuisance properties in the area and expanding the City's redevelopment plan for amateur sports on Independence Boulevard.
- **Promoting Economic Growth:** The City continues to coordinate collaboration among a local consortium of small business resources providers and the support of the CharlotteBusinessResources.com web portal connecting businesses and entrepreneurs with resources for successfully starting and growing their businesses. The website served 22,615 visitors seeking information on local business resources during FY2013. The City led a community celebration of Small Business Week for 170 registrants, and featuring a keynote small business expert and events and program of interest to the small business participants.

HUD OBJECTIVES AND OUTCOME EXPECTATIONS

Activities identified in the FY2015 Action Plan align with the above priorities and are quantified by level of need. By addressing these priorities, the City intends to meet HUD's affordable housing and community and economic development objectives as well as outcome performance expectations. These performance expectations serve as a guide for funding activities.

Three specific HUD objectives relate to CDBG funding. These include:

- **Providing Decent Housing:** Applicable to housing programs where the purpose is to meet individual family or community needs, and not programs where housing is an element of a larger effort, such as would otherwise be applied under the "Creating Suitable Living Environment" objective.
- **Creating Suitable Living Environments:** Applicable to activities that are designed to benefit communities, families, or individuals by addressing issues in their living environment. This objective relates to activities that are intended to address a wide range of issues faced by low-and moderate-income persons, from physical problems with their environment to social issues such as crime prevention, literacy, or elderly health services.
- **Creating Economic Development Opportunities.** Applicable to activities that are related to economic development, commercial revitalization or job creation.

HUD has identified three specific outcomes that relate to the above objectives. These include:

- **Availability/Accessibility:** Activities which make services, infrastructure, housing, or shelter available or accessible to low-and moderate income persons, including persons with disabilities and special needs. In this category, accessibility does not only refer to physical barriers, but also to making the affordable basics of daily living available and accessible to low- and moderate- income people.

- **Affordability:** Activities which provide affordability in a variety of ways. It can include the creation or maintenance of affordable housing, basic move-in services, or services such as transportation or day care. Affordability is an appropriate objective whenever activity is lowering the cost, improving the quality, or increasing the affordability of a product or service to benefit a low- and moderate-income person.

- **Sustainability:** Activities aimed at improving communities or neighborhoods, helping to make them livable or viable by providing benefit to low- and moderate-income persons or by removing or eliminating slum or blighted areas.

Because each activity identified in this FY2015 Action Plan will be implemented with varying intent and purpose, at least one of the above objectives and outcomes is proposed for each Action Plan activity. HUD outcomes and objectives are identified for all the affordable housing and community development objectives included in this plan.

PAST PERFORMANCE

The City of Charlotte anticipates meeting or exceeding all of its program goals in FY2015 for projects that have a one-year cycle.

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CITY CODE CHAPTER 18 –
STORMWATER, ARTICLE IV – POST-CONSTRUCTION
STORMWATER ORDINANCE**

ORDINANCE NO.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CHARLOTTE:

Chapter 18, Article IV “Post-Construction Stormwater” of the Code of the City of Charlotte is hereby amended as follows:

DIVISION 4: DEVELOPMENT AND REDEVELOPMENT MITIGATION

SECTION 18-161: MITIGATION PAYMENT

- a. Amend Section 18-161, MITIGATION PAYMENT, SUBSECTION (c) *Redevelopment not within transit station areas or distressed business districts*. The revised text shall read as follows:

(c) *Redevelopment not within transit station areas or distressed business districts*. For a period of time beginning with approval of this Ordinance amendment and ending ~~April 30, 2014~~ December 31, 2018, projects involving redevelopment of existing built-upon-area and the cumulative addition of less than 20,000 square feet of new built-upon-area, are allowed by right to forego meeting the requirements of this article, except for required stream buffers and phosphorous requirements, provided one of the following measures is implemented on the site:

- (1) If an analysis of the downstream storm water conveyance system confirms that volume and peak control facilities may be waived by the Storm Water Administrator, provide 85 percent TSS removal from first inch of rainfall for entire project and pay the city a mitigation fee according to rates set forth in the administrative manual for the pre-project built upon area and any additional impervious area; or
- (2) If an analysis of the downstream storm water conveyance system confirms that volume and peak control facilities may be waived by the Storm Water Administrator, pay the city a mitigation fee according to rates set forth in the administrative manual for the pre-project built upon area and any additional impervious area; or
- (3) Provide one-year, 24-hour volume control and ten-year, six-hour peak control for entire project and pay the city a mitigation fee according to rates set forth in the administrative manual for the pre-project built upon area and any additional impervious area.

Background and History: In 2010, the North Carolina General Assembly enacted the current set of economic development incentives to encourage production companies to film television series, television mini-series, commercials, movies, documentaries, and webisodes in North Carolina. The legislation created a 25% credit for qualifying expenses and increased the per project cap to \$20 million (up from \$7.5 million), all of which was effective January 1, 2011. For the first full year the incentives were in effect in 2011, the NC Film Office reported that production companies spent over \$220 million in the State, which was twice as much as the previous year, supporting over 3,300 crew positions. Since then the NC Film Office reports that annual direct in-state spending from film productions has increased further, the number of well-paying crew positions has grown to over 4,000, and productions have taken place in 30 of the State's 100 counties.

Current Need/Problem (including potential allies or detractors): The film refundable tax credit program sunsets on January 1, 2015 and will require legislative action in 2014 to keep the program in operation. Since 2010, many States have implemented or strengthened their film production incentives. Major production companies have communicated that the continuation of the refundable tax credit program will be a deciding factor in whether to continue producing film television series, television mini-series, commercials, movies, documentaries, and webisodes and help grow the film industry in the State. The retention of the film refundable tax credit program is supported by a wide range of organizations including the film production industry, regional film commissions, local governments, and the North Carolina League of Municipalities.

Impact if Adopted: If the sunset date on the film production tax credit is eliminated, then such action will encourage more production companies to film in the State resulting in even more economic benefits.

Background and History: The maximum public transportation vehicle length of 40 feet for City of Charlotte buses was legislated in 1955 (S.L. 1955-317). Legislative efforts were made in 2007 to increase the maximum length to 60 feet but 45 feet was chosen due to concerns over the abilities of vehicles of over 45 feet in length to maneuver around public streets without posing a danger to pedestrians, passengers and other motorists. In 2013 HB 375 (Jeter, Bryan, Schaffer and Cotham) was introduced to allow the Charlotte Area Transit System to operate up to 60 foot buses on public streets or highways with a posted speed limit of 45 miles per hour or greater within the County of Mecklenburg or any contiguous county. HB 375 will enable the transit system to operate longer vehicles on routes primarily serving outlying communities including many of the commuter express routes. HB 375 passed the House of Representatives prior to crossover and was eventually referred to the Committee on Rules and Operations of the Senate where it currently resides.

Current Need/Problem (including potential allies or detractors): An increase in the length of public transportation vehicles will allow the transit system to achieve greater efficiency through additional seating capacity per trip, reduce air pollution, traffic congestion and overall operating costs because fewer buses are required. Such vehicles are commonly referred to as high capacity buses and are used by larger public transportation agencies for high volume, limited stop routes as well as for bus rapid transit systems. In terms of safety, both anecdotal evidence and a 2008 study commissioned by the Federal Transit Administration found no significant safety issues or risks related to operating high capacity buses. The legislation was requested by and is supported by the Metropolitan Transit Commission.

Impact if Adopted: The addition of high capacity buses will allow the transit system to better serve its increasing bus ridership brought on by increased population growth, rising fuel prices and significant changes in the public's travel patterns, and can lead to reduced maintenance costs for and less air pollution emitted from public transportation buses.

Background and History: The City of Charlotte levies a privilege license tax, which generates approximately \$17 million annually. The tax was designed to give cities a way to cover the additional expense of providing services that result from business activity. The revenues accrue to the General Fund and support public safety, transportation, sanitation and other public services. The privilege license is one of only two taxes that cities have the authority to impose. It is the only local option tax that derives revenue from non-property owners who consume services, allowing cities to better match the cost of services to the consumers of services. The City of Charlotte follows all applicable State statutes in levying the tax.

Current Need/Problem (including potential allies or detractors): The Joint House and Senate Revenue Laws Committee of the North Carolina General Assembly is examining the future of the privilege license tax due to the complexities of current State privilege license tax statutes. Proposals have been discussed that eliminate the various limitations and exemptions of the tax and authorize cities to charge up to a minimal amount for each business, regardless of the impacts that certain types of businesses have upon infrastructure and the economy. The Committee will be making a recommendation on the future of the tax to the 2014 General Assembly. While the City supports reducing the complexity of the tax by eliminating the various exemptions and maximums for certain types of business and implementing a uniform method of taxing businesses, the privilege license tax should continue to be a reliable and growing source of revenue that supports services to businesses and customers. Accordingly, the City will be evaluating proposals based upon the stability of the proposed revenue base, future revenue growth possibilities, and fiscal impacts upon the City. Many local governments and the North Carolina League of Municipalities share the city's position.

Impact if Adopted: If the privilege license tax were to be repealed in its entirety without an equivalent source of revenue, it would require a 2.1 cent property tax increase to make up the difference.

WHEREAS, the contract for financial assistance may impose certain obligations upon the applicant, including the provision by it of the local share of project costs;

Memorandum of Understanding

Between the City of Charlotte (“MEMBER”) and Centralina Council of Governments (“CCOG”) For Membership in the Global Charlotte Manufacturing Community Consortium

WHEREAS, the Global Charlotte Manufacturing Community Region, consisting of Charlotte USA 16 county bi-state zone (“Region”), is a leading and growing national and global center for Advanced Manufacturing in support of a Manufacturing Super-cluster of six industry sectors, including Logistics & Transportation Commerce, Aerospace and Defense, Automotive, Biomedical, Healthcare, and Energy, as evidenced by:

- The 2012-2017 Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (“CEDS”) that identified Advanced Manufacturing as a distinctive competency of the Region supporting the Manufacturing Super-cluster;
- The award of a 2013 Investing in Manufacturing Communities Partnership (“IMCP”) Strategy Planning Grant from the U.S. Economic Development Administration (“EDA”) to Centralina Council of Governments (“CCOG”) in partnership with the Centralina Economic Development Commission (“CEDC”) to develop implementation-ready strategies to support Advanced Manufacturing and operationalize this regional competency thereby providing critical competitive advantage across the growing industry clusters; and

WHEREAS, the IMCP Strategy Planning Grant is also funding the development of a Charlotte Advanced Manufacturing Partnership and Innovation Outreach Network (“CHAMPION”) that will bring together manufacturers, suppliers, educators, workforce boards, and economic developers to collaboratively implement Advanced Manufacturing strategies; and

WHEREAS, the EDA has announced a Federal Interagency Competition titled “Fiscal Year 2014 Investing in Manufacturing Communities Partnership” through which designation as a Manufacturing Community will only be awarded to twelve communities nationwide; and

WHEREAS, Manufacturing Community designation will confer exclusive benefits, including:

- Preferential consideration (or supplemental awards) for selected federal funding streams offered through IMCP Participating Agencies (“IMCP Grants”);
- A Point of Contact to help access federal economic developing funding and other assistance;
- Branding and promotion as a Manufacturing Community that may help attract investors and other partners;
- Possible consideration for federal financial assistance through EDA Challenge Grant Awards; and

WHEREAS, CCOG plans to submit a proposal for Designation as a Manufacturing Community to the EDA (“Proposal”); and

WHEREAS, the Global Charlotte Manufacturing Community Consortium is a voluntary alliance of organizations in the Region, whose purpose is to support the Region’s Manufacturing Super-cluster by assisting CCOG and CEDC in their IMCP efforts as defined in in this MOU and proposal; and

WHEREAS, if designation as a Manufacturing Community is awarded, it is the intent of the Consortium to align itself with the CHAMPION once development of CHAMPION as described above is complete; and

WHEREAS, participation as a Consortium member does not preclude MEMBER from potential eligibility as a sub grantee or subcontractor to CCOG, CEDC, or the Consortium pursuant to any IMCP Grants; and

WHEREAS, the obligations incumbent on all members of the Consortium (“Membership Obligations”) are as shown in Exhibit A, attached and incorporated herein by reference;

NOW, THEREFORE, MEMBER, by signing this memorandum of understanding, agrees to:

1. Be a member of the Global Charlotte Manufacturing Community Consortium, abiding by, supporting, and fulfilling the Membership Obligations, Goals and Functional Organization as defined in Exhibit A; and
2. Lead or participate in as appropriate, other proposals or funding opportunity applications that serve the strategic implementation objectives of the Global Charlotte manufacturing Community Consortium or CHAMPION as defined in the proposed future implementation strategies;

AND FURTHERMORE, the CCOG agrees, on its own behalf, as a member of the Consortium, to

1. Abide by and fulfill the Membership Obligations; and
2. Act as Consortium Manager solely as a benefit and convenience to MEMBER;
3. Seek MEMBER’s assistance and advice in drafting the Proposal and to timely submit the Proposal to the EDA.

AND FURTHERMORE, the CCOG agrees to confer on MEMBER the following benefits of participation in the Consortium:

1. Recognize MEMBER as a Consortium member with full voice at all Consortium meetings;
2. Notify MEMBER of all Consortium activities and opportunities for participation;
3. Provide MEMBER with access to information and data collected by the Consortium pursuant to this project;

THIS AGREEMENT shall be in effect from the date of adoption through June 30, 2016, and may be renewed by mutual written agreement among the parties. This agreement may be amended by the mutual written consent of both parties, provided that approval for such amendment is given as was given for the initial agreement.

Either party may elect to terminate this Agreement by providing 30 days’ written notification to the other party’s Chief Executive Officer. Organizations withdrawing from the Consortium will be accountable for any data, maps or other information due under Membership Obligations promised prior to the effective date of such withdrawal.

HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION - CHARLOTTE
 (12 Members)

Membership - One member shall represent the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Planning Commission and shall be recommended for appointment by that commission for a one year term. Each of the Historic districts - Fourth Ward, Plaza-Midwood, Dilworth, Wesley Heights and Hermitage Court shall be represented by one residential property owner (Council appointment). The membership will be expanded by one (a property owner) for each newly designated district. The Board of Directors of neighborhood association of each district shall recommend nominations for their position in compliance with the associations's by-laws, but such recommendations shall not be binding on the City Council.

On April 17, 2006, City Council approved Ordinance No. 3256 Z creating Hermitage Court Historical District. On May 17, 2010, City Council approved Ordinance No. 4419-Z, creating the Wilmore Historic District Overlay. The new historic district will be represented by one residential property owner who shall be appointed by the Mayor.

In addition, the Dilworth Historic District, because of its make-up, shall be represented by the operator of a business in that district.

If any of the district representatives ceases to be a property owner in the respective historic district, that appointee shall be permitted to continue in his position if more than fifty(50) percent of his term has been served.

A majority of the membership shall have demonstrated special interest, experience, or education in history, architecture, and or other relevant discipline; all must reside within the corporate limits of the City of Charlotte - both criteria required by State Statute. Terms are for three years and no member may serve on the Commission for more than two full consecutive terms.

Responsibilities - To ensure the preservation of any areas, structures, site and objects that are significant elements of the cultural, social, economic, political, or architectural history of Charlotte; to safeguard the heritage of the city through the preservation and conservation of historical areas for the education, pleasure, and enhancement of the residents of the City.

The Mayor's appointments shall be as follows: **Category #1** - one (1) taxicab, limousine or other vehicle for hire company owner; **Category #2** - one (1) shall be a driver or chauffeur; **Category #3** - one (1) representative of the Hospitality & Tourism Industry. The Mayor shall designate one of the 11 members as chairman.

The City Council's appointments shall be as follows: **Category #1** - one (1) taxicab, limousine or other vehicle for hire company owner; **Category #2** - one (1) is the vehicle owner of a passenger vehicle for hire or limousine; **Category #3** - one (1) representative of the Hospitality & Tourism Industry; **Category #4** - one (1) a user of passenger vehicles for hire; **Category #5** - one (1) person with a disability or a representative from an organization that represents persons with disabilities.

The three (3) members appointed by the City Manager shall be citizens with no financial interest or business affiliation with either the passenger vehicle for hire, limousine or hospitality/tourism industries.

All members are required to live in Mecklenburg County and a local background check will be conducted on all nominations.

Responsibilities - Ensure to preserve the safety, welfare and proper of the visitors, and citizens of Charlotte using passenger vehicles for hire and limousines through the enforcement and regulations of the policies and provisions within the Passenger Vehicle for Hire Ordinance.

The duties include: 1) hearing and ruling on appeals as submitted to the board from company owners, drivers and others as outlined within the ordinance; 2) review, establish, and monitor taxicab rates (through industry information and public hearings); 3) review and monitor the numbers of company, vehicle, and driver permits to ensure proper servicing of the public by the passenger vehicles for hire industry (results of which would be recommendations to City Council).

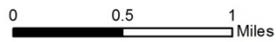

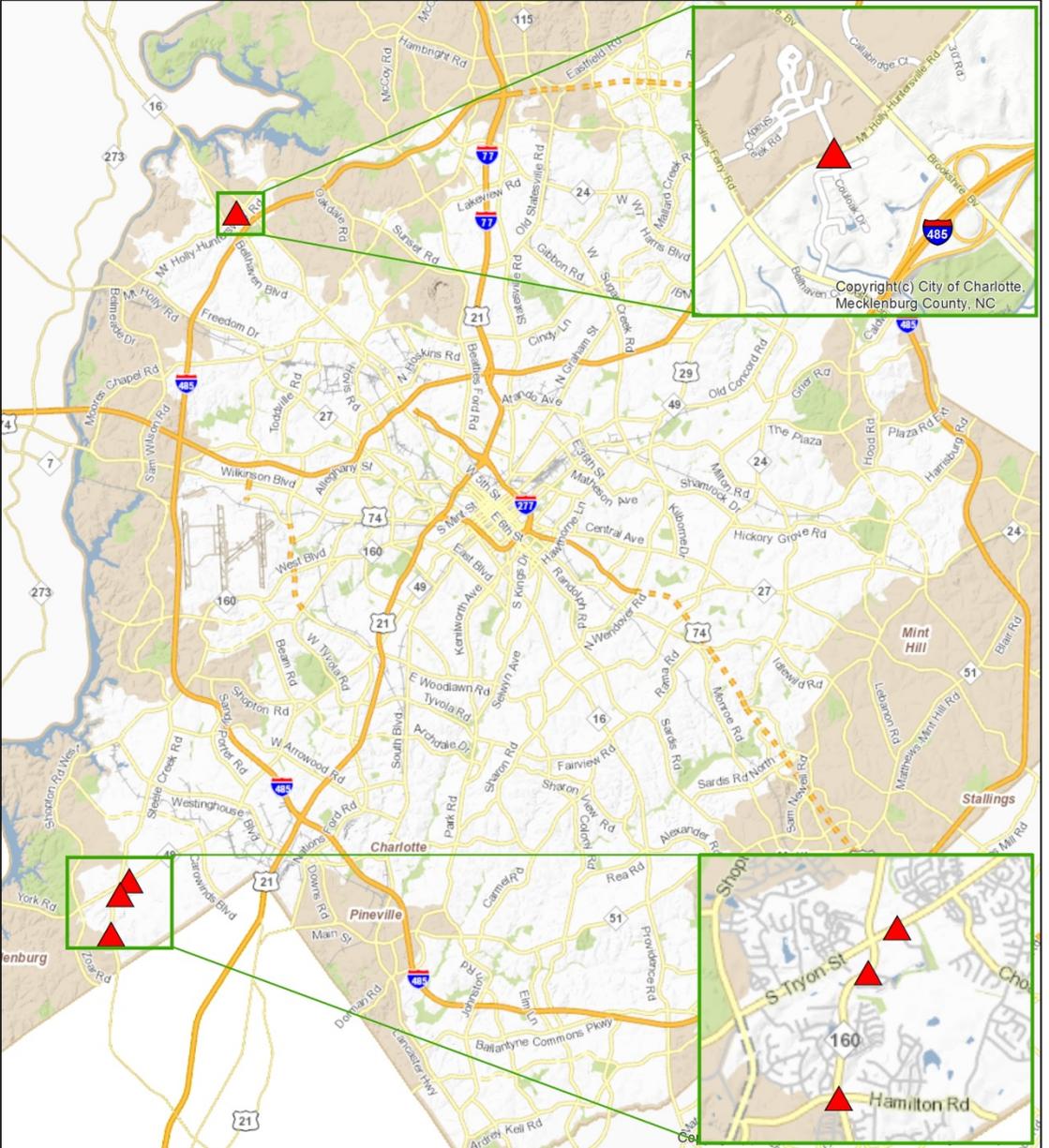

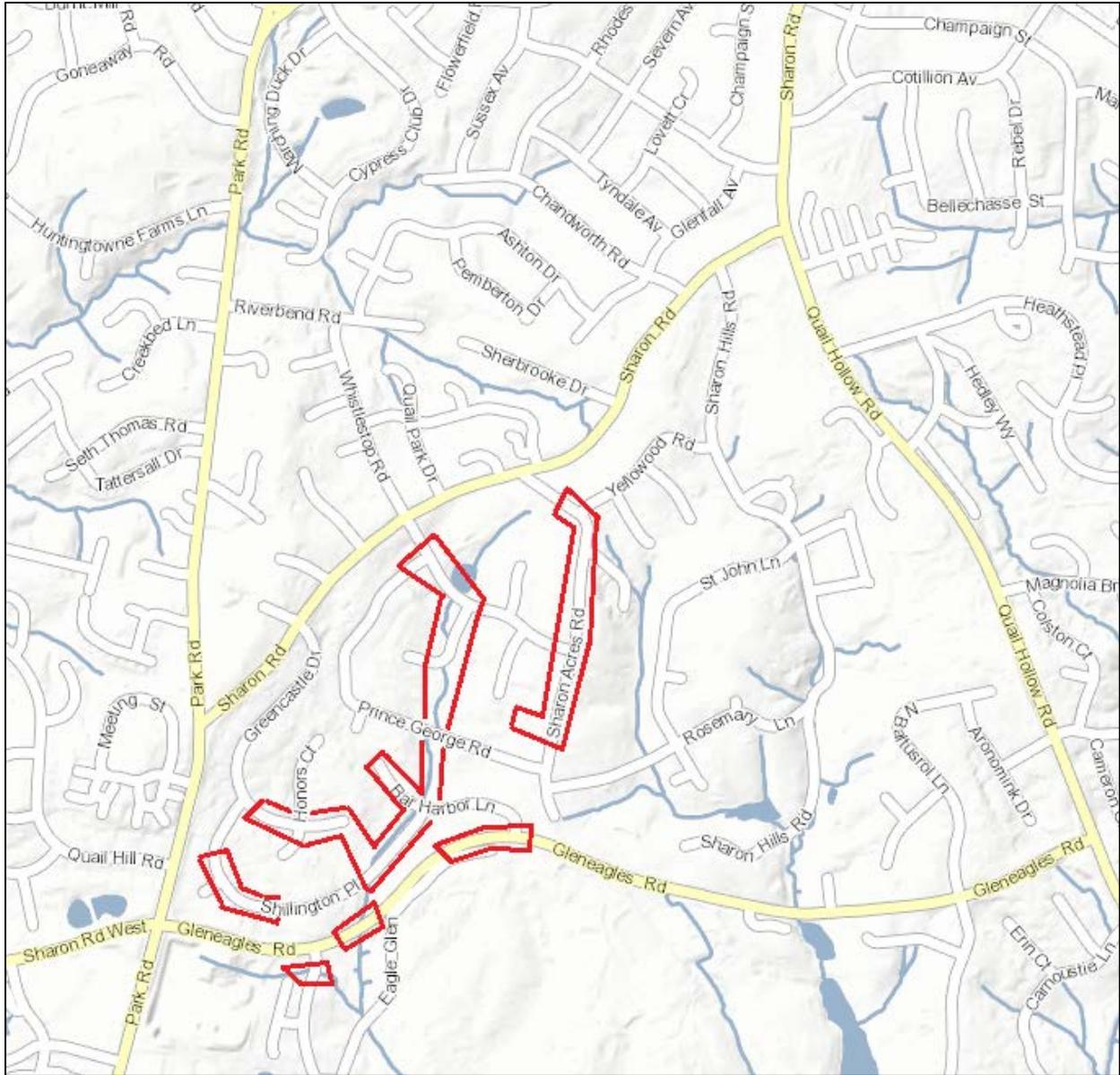

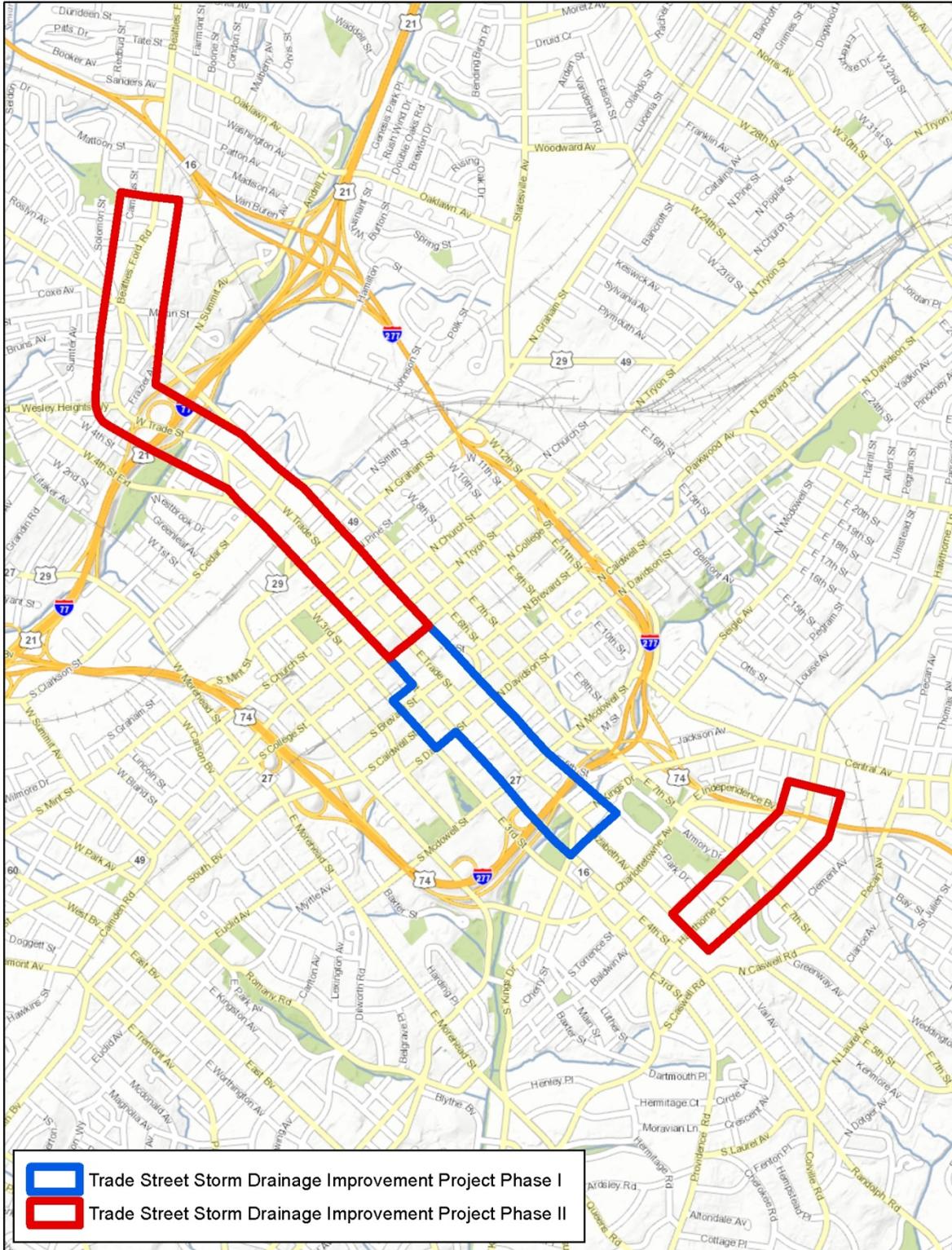




Location Map: Ashley Farm Pond Water Quality Enhancement

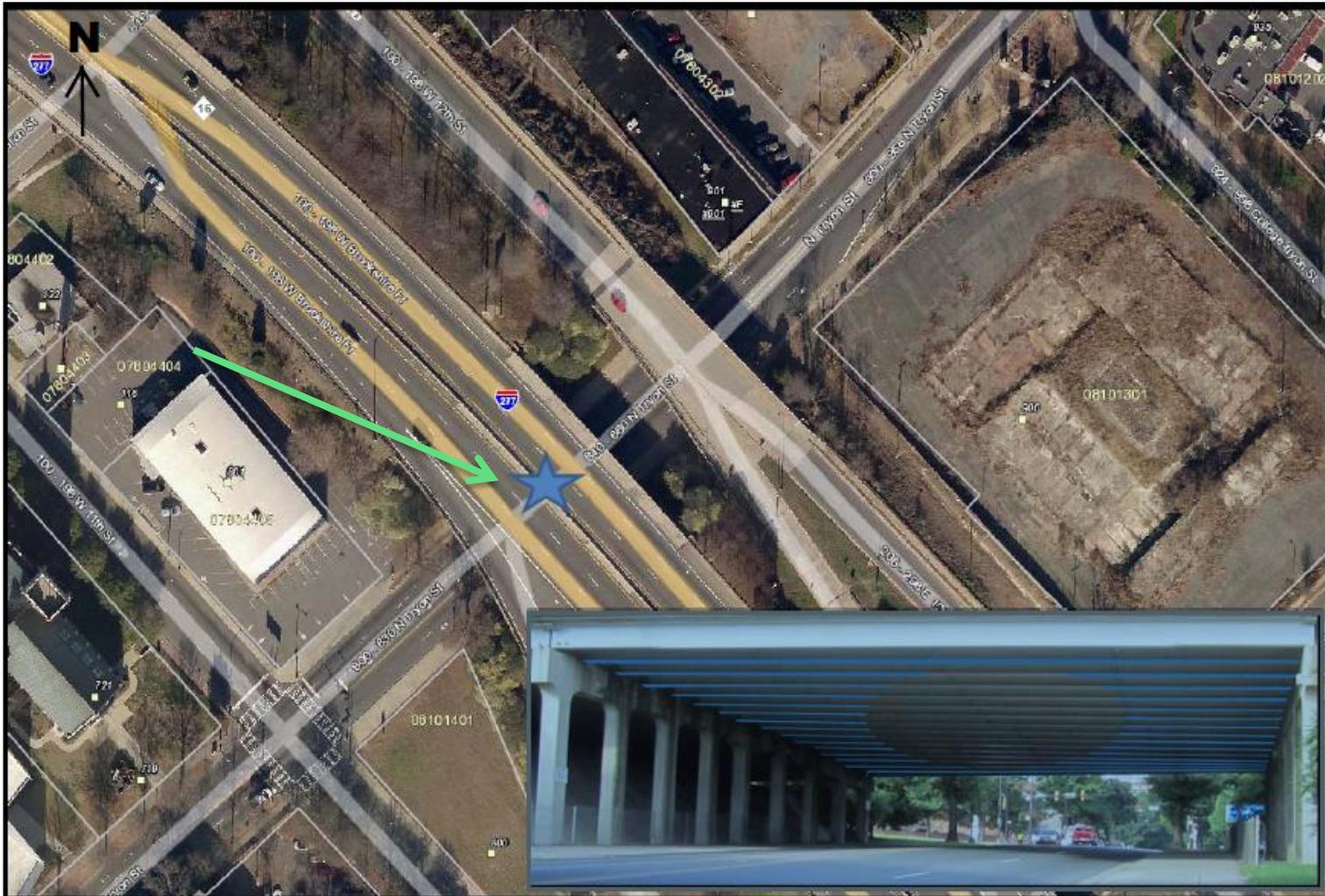

Whereas, City staff, the Arts & Science Council, and Public Art Commission have identified the I-277/North Tryon Street underpass as an appropriate location for Public Art that will help build excitement about upcoming business corridor enhancements scheduled to take place on North Tryon Street;

Whereas, the NCDOT adopted the North Carolina Public Art on the Right of Way Policy in December 2010, recognizing that transportation facilities enhanced by public art elements provide aesthetic and cultural benefits to a community that can potentially result in positive economic development and tourism both locally and throughout North Carolina; and

Whereas, the North Carolina Public Art on the Right of Way Policy provides that local government agencies may request placing Public Art on NCDOT rights of way, provided the local government conforms to the Policy’s parameters and procedures, to include, but not limited to an encroachment permit, financial responsibility for construction and maintenance of the Public Art, and an adopted local resolution.
