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An adjourned meeting of the City Council was held in the Commissioners' Room in the Court House of Mecklenburg County in Charlotte, North Carolina, at 10 o'clock a.m., on April 25, 1946.

Present: Mayor Baxter, and Councilmen Childs, Johnston, Puette and White.

Absent: Councilmen Hinson, McIntyre and Newson.

Mr. Chase Brenizer, Chairman, Board of Elections of Mecklenburg County, recommended that the Registrars be paid \$7.00 for the additional registration day, the Bond Attorneys having required four registration days instead of the usual three. Councilman Childs moved that the additional \$7.00 be paid each Registrar. Motion seconded by Councilman Johnston, and unanimously carried.

After calling the meeting to order and after the City Clerk had called the roll, the members of the City Council of the City of Charlotte sat at the table at which the County Board of Elections was holding its meeting and thereupon said County Board of Elections and said City Council of the City of Charlotte, as two separate bodies, separately received from the registrars and judges of election in the various precincts of the City of Charlotte the returns of the special election held April 23, 1946. After said returns had been canvassed by said City Council, being simultaneously with the canvassing thereof by the County Board of Elections in the same place, Councilman Childs introduced the following resolution, which was read:

RESOLUTION CANVASSING THE RETURNS OF
THE SPECIAL ELECTION HELD IN THE CITY
OF CHARLOTTE ON APRIL 23, 1946, AND
DECLARING THE RESULT THEREOF.

BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Charlotte:

Section 1. That the returns of the special election held in the City of Charlotte on April 23, 1946 having been received from the proper election officers and the City Council having canvassed the same, the following facts are hereby found and determined:

(a) That each of the registrars and judges for the special election held in the City of Charlotte on April 23, 1946 was duly qualified by law and had taken the necessary oath.

(b) That the election officers had incorporated in their returns not only the number of votes cast for and against each of the questions submitted, but also the number of voters registered and qualified to vote in each precinct in the election.

(c) That the City Council has examined the special registration books made for said election.

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(d) That at said election there were submitted to the qualified voters of said City of Charlotte the following questions:

(a) UNDER AUTHORITY OF THE MUNICIPAL FINANCE ACT, 1921, AS AMENDED:

1. Shall an ordinance passed March 11, 1946, authorizing not exceeding \$2,325,000 bonds of the City of Charlotte for extending and enlarging the sanitary sewer system of the City, including the construction of a treatment plant or plants, replacing pipes, and acquiring necessary lands, and a tax for said bonds, be approved?
2. Shall an ordinance passed March 11, 1946, authorizing not exceeding \$1,800,000 bonds of the City of Charlotte for extending and enlarging the waterworks system of the City, including enlarging the filter plant and pumping facilities, and replacing water mains, and a tax for said bonds, be approved?
3. Shall an ordinance passed March 11, 1946, authorizing not exceeding \$200,000 bonds of the City of Charlotte for erecting and equipping an administration building at the municipal airport and making other airport capital improvements, and a tax for said bonds, be approved?
4. Shall an ordinance passed March 11, 1946, authorizing not exceeding \$200,000 bonds of the City of Charlotte for erecting and equipping additional buildings for parks and playgrounds, constructing playground facilities including swimming pools, and including the acquisition of necessary lands, and a tax for said bonds, be approved?
5. Shall an ordinance passed March 11, 1946, authorizing not exceeding \$200,000 bonds of the City of Charlotte for constructing or reconstructing the surface of streets in said City, including the contemporaneous construction or reconstruction of sidewalks, curbs, gutters and drains, and including grading, and a tax for said bonds, be approved?
6. Shall an ordinance passed March 11, 1946, authorizing not exceeding \$50,000 bonds of the City of Charlotte for establishing clinics and dispensaries, including the erection and equipment of buildings and acquiring sites therefor, if necessary, and a tax for said bonds, be approved?
7. Shall an ordinance passed March 13, 1946, authorizing not exceeding \$750,000 bonds of the City of Charlotte for erecting and equipping a municipal building to be used as a place for public gatherings and meetings, and acquiring a site therefor, and a tax for said bonds, be approved?

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8. Shall an ordinance passed March 11, 1946 authorizing not exceeding \$112,500 bonds of the City of Charlotte for erecting fire stations, and a tax for said bonds, be approved?
9. Shall an ordinance passed March 11, 1946, authorizing not exceeding \$37,500 bonds of the City of Charlotte for acquiring fire fighting apparatus and equipment, and a tax for said bonds, be approved?

(b) UNDER AUTHORITY OF THE MUNICIPAL FINANCE ACT, 1921, AS AMENDED, AND CHAPTER 519 OF THE 1945 SESSION LAWS:

1. Shall an ordinance passed March 11, 1946, authorizing not exceeding \$300,000 Library Bonds of the City of Charlotte for erecting and equipping a public library building or buildings and acquiring such real and personal property as may be useful or necessary for such purposes, and a tax for said bonds, be approved?
2. If a majority of the qualified registered voters of the City of Charlotte shall vote in favor of the approval of the bond ordinance mentioned in the foregoing question, and if a majority of the qualified registered voters of Mecklenburg County shall vote in favor of the approval of a bond order authorizing a like amount of bonds for the same purpose, shall a special tax not to exceed five cents on each one hundred dollars of the assessed value of real and personal property taxable in the City of Charlotte be levied and collected annually for maintenance and support of the Public Library of Charlotte and Mecklenburg County?

(c) UNDER AUTHORITY OF CHAPTER 356 OF THE 1945 SESSION LAWS:

Shall the ad valorem tax of two cents which is now being annually levied on each one hundred dollars of the assessed value of real and personal property taxable in the City of Charlotte for park and recreation purposes, be increased to seven cents?

Section 2. That the following schedule correctly shows the designations of the several precincts in which such election was held, the number of voters registered at the special registration provided for said election and who were accordingly qualified to vote in each precinct in the election, the number of votes cast in each precinct in favor of each of said questions, the number cast against each of said questions, and the totals of such numbers:

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Section 3. That no complaint has been made to the City Council against the regularity of said election and that the City Council believes that said election was conducted in full accordance with law and with the orders of the City Council.

Section 4. That from the canvass so made by this Board it is determined:

(a) That 7,330 voters were registered in said special registration and were qualified to vote.

(b) That at said election 4,436 voters voted for the ordinance authorizing not exceeding \$2,325,000 bonds of the City of Charlotte for extending and enlarging the sanitary sewer system of the City, including the construction of a treatment plant or plants, replacing pipes, and acquiring necessary lands, and a tax for said bonds, and that 1,078 voters voted against said ordinance, and that a majority of all the qualified voters of said city voting at said election voted in favor of the approval of said ordinance and that said ordinance was thereby approved and is in force and effect.

(c) That at said election 4,422 voters voted for the ordinance authorizing not exceeding \$1,800,000 bonds of the City of Charlotte for extending and enlarging the waterworks system of the city, including enlarging the filter plant and pumping facilities, and replacing water mains, and a tax for said bonds, and that 1,062 voters voted against said ordinance, and that a majority of all the qualified voters of said city voting at said election voted in favor of the approval of said ordinance and that said ordinance was thereby approved and is in force and effect.

(d) That at said election 2,983 voters voted for the ordinance authorizing not exceeding \$200,000 bonds of the City of Charlotte for erecting and equipping an administration building at the municipal airport and making other airport capital improvements, and a tax for said bonds, and that 2,321 voters voted against said ordinance, and that a majority of all the qualified voters of said City did not vote in favor of the approval of said ordinance and that said ordinance was, therefore, not approved.

(e) That at said election 3,431 voters voted for the ordinance authorizing not exceeding \$200,000 bonds of the City of Charlotte for erecting and equipping additional buildings for parks and playgrounds, constructing ~~playground facilities~~ including swimming pools, and including the acquisition of necessary lands, and a tax for said bonds, and that 1,960 voters voted against said ordinance, and that a majority of all the qualified voters of said City did not vote in favor of the approval of said ordinance and that said ordinance was, therefore, not approved.

(f) That at said election 3,957 voters voted for the ordinance authorizing not exceeding \$200,000 bonds of the City of Charlotte for constructing or reconstructing the surface of streets in said City, including the contemporaneous construction or reconstruction of sidewalks, curbs, gutters, and drains, and including grading, and a tax for said bonds, and that 1,438 voters voted against said ordinance, and that a majority of all the qualified voters of said City voting at said election voted in favor of the approval of said ordinance and that said ordinance was thereby approved and is in force and effect.

(g) That at said election 3,727 voters voted for the ordinance authorizing not exceeding \$50,000 bonds of the City of Charlotte for establishing clinics and dispensaries, including the erection and equipment of buildings and acquiring sites therefor, if necessary, and a tax for said bonds, and that 1,646 voters voted against said ordinance, and that a majority of all the qualified voters of said City voted in favor of the approval of said ordinance and that said ordinance was thereby approved and is in force and effect.

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(h) That at said election 3,250 voters voted for the ordinance authorizing not exceeding \$750,000 bonds of the City of Charlotte for erecting and equipping a municipal building to be used as a place for public gatherings and meetings, and acquiring a site therefor, and a tax for said bonds, and that 2,092 voters voted against said ordinance, and that a majority of all the qualified voters of said City did not vote in favor of the approval of said ordinance and that said ordinance was, therefore, not approved.

(i) That at said election 4,028 voters voted for the ordinance authorizing not exceeding \$112,500 bonds of the City of Charlotte for erecting fire stations, and a tax for said bonds; and that 1,373 voters voted against said ordinance, and that a majority of all the qualified voters of said City voting at said election voted in favor of the approval of said ordinance and that said ordinance was thereby approved and is in force and effect.

(j) That at said election 4,100 voters voted for the ordinance authorizing not exceeding \$37,500 bonds of the City of Charlotte for acquiring fire fighting apparatus and equipment, and a tax for said bonds, and that 1,324 voters voted against said ordinance, and that a majority of all the qualified voters of said City voting at said election voted in favor of the approval of said ordinance and that said ordinance was thereby approved and is in force and effect.

(k) That at said election 3,437 voters voted for the ordinance authorizing not exceeding \$300,000 Library Bonds of the City of Charlotte for erecting and equipping a public library building or buildings and acquiring such real and personal property as may be useful or necessary for such purposes, and a tax for said bonds, and that 1,952 voters voted against such ordinance, and that a majority of all the qualified voters of said City did not vote in favor of the approval of said ordinance and that said ordinance was, therefore, not approved.

(l) That at said election 3,039 voters voted for the special tax not to exceed five cents on each one hundred dollars of the assessed value of real and personal property taxable in the City of Charlotte to be levied and collected annually for maintenance and support of the Public Library of Charlotte and Mecklenburg County, and 1,849 voters voted against said special maintenance tax, and that a majority of all the qualified voters of said City did not vote in favor of the approval of said special maintenance tax, and that said special maintenance tax was, therefore, not approved.

(m) That at said election 3,383 voters voted for the increase of the ad valorem tax of two cents which is now being annually levied on each one hundred dollars of the assessed value of real and personal property taxable in the City of Charlotte for park and recreation purposes to seven cents, and that 2121 voters voted against said increase, and that a majority of all the qualified voters of said City did not vote in favor of the approval of the increase of said park and recreation tax, and such increase of park and recreation tax was, therefore, not approved.

Upon motion of Councilman Childs, seconded by Councilman Johnston, and unanimously carried, the foregoing resolution entitled "Resolution Canvassing the Returns of the Special Election Held in the City of Charlotte on April 23, 1946, and Declaring the Result Thereof", was passed by the following vote:

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Thereupon Councilman White introduced the following resolution, which was read:

4,436 votes were cast for the ordinance authorizing not exceeding \$2,325,000 bonds of the City of Charlotte for extending and enlarging the sanitary sewer system of the City, including the construction of a treatment plant or plants, replacing pipes, and acquiring necessary lands, and a tax for said bonds, and 1,078 votes were cast against said ordinance, and a majority of all the qualified voters of said City voting at said election voted in favor of the approval of said ordinance and said ordinance was thereby approved and is in force and effect.

4,422 votes were cast for the ordinance authorizing not exceeding \$1,800,000 bonds of the City of Charlotte for extending and enlarging the waterworks system of the City, including enlarging the filter plant and pumping facilities, and replacing water mains, and a tax for said bonds, and 1,062 votes were cast against said ordinance, and a majority of all the qualified voters of said City voting at said election voted in favor of the approval of said ordinance and said ordinance was thereby approved and is in force and effect.

2,983 votes were cast for the ordinance authorizing not exceeding \$200,000 bonds of the City of Charlotte for erecting and equipping an administration building at the municipal airport and making other airport capital improvements, and a tax for said bonds, and 2,321 votes were cast against said ordinance, and a majority of all the qualified voters of said City did not vote in favor of the approval of said ordinance and said ordinance was therefore not approved.

3,431 votes were cast for the ordinance authorizing not exceeding \$200,000 bonds of the City of Charlotte for erecting and equipping additional buildings for parks and playgrounds, constructing playground facilities including swimming pools, and including the acquisition of necessary lands, and a tax for said bonds, and 1,960 votes were cast against said ordinance, and a majority of all the qualified voters of said City did not vote in favor of the approval of said ordinance and said ordinance was therefore not approved.

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3,957 votes were cast for the ordinance authorizing not exceeding \$200,000 bonds of the City of Charlotte for constructing or reconstructing the surface of streets in said City, including the contemporaneous construction of sidewalks, curbs, gutters, and drains, and including grading, and a tax for said bonds, and 1,438 votes were cast against said ordinance, and a majority of all the qualified voters of said City voting at said election voted in favor of the approval of said ordinance and said ordinance was thereby approved and is in force and effect.

3,727 votes were cast for the ordinance authorizing not exceeding \$50,000 bonds of the City of Charlotte for establishing clinics and dispensaries, including the erection and equipment of buildings and acquiring sites therefor, if necessary, and a tax for said bonds, and 1,646 votes were cast against said ordinance, and a majority of all the qualified voters of said City voted in favor of the approval of said ordinance and said ordinance was thereby approved, and is in force and effect.

3,250 votes were cast for the ordinance authorizing not exceeding \$750,000 bonds of the City of Charlotte for erecting and equipping a municipal building to be used as a place for public gatherings and meetings and acquiring a site therefor, and a tax for said bonds, and 2,092 votes were cast against said ordinance, and a majority of all the qualified voters of said City did not vote in favor of the approval of said ordinance and said ordinance was therefore not approved.

4,028 votes were cast for the ordinance authorizing not exceeding \$112,500 bonds of the City of Charlotte for erecting fire stations, and a tax for said bonds, and 1,373 votes were cast against said ordinance, and a majority of all the qualified voters of said City voting at said election voted in favor of the approval of said ordinance and said ordinance was thereby approved and is in force and effect.

4,100 votes were cast for the ordinance authorizing not exceeding \$37,500 bonds of the City of Charlotte for acquiring fire fighting apparatus and equipment, and a tax for said bonds, and 1,324 votes were cast against said ordinance, and a majority of all the qualified voters of said City voting at said election voted in favor of the approval of said ordinance and said ordinance was thereby approved and is in force and effect.

3,437 votes were cast for the ordinance authorizing not exceeding \$300,000 Library Bonds of the City of Charlotte for erecting and equipping a public library building or buildings and acquiring such real and personal property as may be useful or necessary for such purposes, and a tax for said bonds, and 1,952 votes were cast against said ordinance, and a majority of all the qualified voters of said City did not vote in favor of the approval of said ordinance and said ordinance was therefore not approved.

3,039 votes were cast for the special tax not to exceed five cents on each one hundred dollars of the assessed value of real and personal property taxable in the City of Charlotte to be levied and collected annually for maintenance and support of the Public Library of Charlotte and Mecklenburg County, and 1,849 votes were cast against said special maintenance tax, and a majority of all the qualified voters of said City did not vote in favor of the approval of said special maintenance tax, and said special maintenance tax was therefore not approved.

3,383 votes were cast for the increase of the ad valorem tax of two cents which is now being annually levied on each one hundred dollars of the assessed value of real and personal property taxable in the City of Charlotte for park and recreation purposes to seven cents, and 2,121 votes were cast against said increase, and a majority of all the qualified voters of said City did not vote in favor of the approval of the increase of said
