Stephanie Kelly Named President of NC Association of Municipal Clerks

Last weekend, Charlotte City Clerk Stephanie Kelly was named the 38th president of the North Carolina Association of Municipal Clerks. Kelly will service in this capacity for one year, her term expiring August 2015.

The North Carolina Association of Municipal Clerks is a professional organization of clerks from across the state, dedicated to the continued growth and development of the municipal clerk, perhaps the oldest known role in municipal government.

South Tryon On-Street Parking Pilot Project

In collaboration with Charlotte Center City Partners, the South End Neighborhood Association, and NCDOT, CDOT has developed a plan for testing on-street parking along South Tryon Street from Park Avenue to Bland Street in South End during off-peak traffic hours.

As a pilot project, parking will be allowed on both sides of the street between 6:30 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. on weekdays and all day on weekends. The parking configuration and timing maintains capacity for commuter traffic and adds 54 spaces for evening patrons for businesses in South End. The pilot project will begin in the next two to three weeks and will last four months. During the project, the CDOT and the NCDOT will evaluate safety, community response and operations to determine if the parking can become permanent.

Results of the pilot project will be communicated to City Council through a future Council-Manager Memo.

Annual Wastewater Report Announced

In September, customers will receive the attached bill insert about how Charlotte-Mecklenburg Utility Department has successfully collected and treated the community's wastewater before recycling it into the environment. Wastewater treatment plants continued their award winning performance as they treated 30 billion gallons of wastewater during Fiscal Year 2014.

There were 247 sanitary sewer overflows, a condition when sanitary sewer collection pipes are blocked or otherwise restricted causing wastewater to flow out of manholes, in CMUD's service area during FY 2014. These are mostly caused by grease clogs and/or tree root blockages.

There were 13 fewer overflows in FY 2014 than the year before. This is the lowest number of overflows since 2001 (213). The number of overflows per 100 miles of pipe continued to decline from 10.9 in 2007 to 5.9 in FY 2014. CMUD's work to install larger sewer pipes less prone to blockage, and to regularly and systematically clean existing pipes, contributes to this decline.

Four of CMUD's five wastewater treatment plants earned Peak Performance Awards from the National Association of Clean Water Agencies for the calendar year ending 2013. This award recognizes wastewater treatment professionals throughout the nation that protect the environment and public health through outstanding treatment and discharge regulatory compliance.
