**SUBJECT: Week 12 State Legislative Report**

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**HOT TOPICS**

**Transportation Reform:** Governor announced a major change in allocating transportation funding to the various regions of the State; faced with a \$1.7 billion decrease in transportation funding over the next ten years and an expected 1.3 million increase in population, the intent of the “Strategic Mobility Formula” is to direct transportation revenues to projects that produce the most economic benefits and improvements in travel times; all modes of transportation will compete for funding from the same pool; 40% of the funds will go to statewide projects, 40% to regional projects and 20% to local projects; several members of both chambers have been selected as bill sponsors including Rep. Brawley; legislation is not available for review at this time but the changes would be implemented immediately; Powell Bill funding to local governments for local street maintenance will be “held harmless” and staff understands that the State commitment of \$25 million per year to the Blue Line Extension would still be honored by the State

**Charlotte Regional Airport Authority Act (SB 81 – Rucho / HB 104 – Brawley)** Legislation transfers control of the Charlotte Douglas International Airport from the City of Charlotte to an independent Authority composed of 13 members; Charlotte City Council, Charlotte Mayor, County Commissions of Mecklenburg, Gaston, Cabarrus, Lincoln, Iredell and Union, Speaker of the House, Senate President Pro Tem, and Governor would each get one appointee; final two appointees would be picked by Authority members; in Senate Finance, committee added power for the Authority to exercise eminent domain for public uses at the Airport but only after being authorized by a majority of the eight local government appointee members of the Authority; SB 81 goes on to state that the power of eminent domain may not be used by the Authority to acquire land for uses such as hotels, motels, restaurants, or industrial parks; HB 104 referred to House Transportation; SB 81 passed Senate and has been sent to the House; SB 81 has been

referred to House Transportation and if reported favorably to House Finance; HB 104 was discussed among committee members in House Transportation on Tuesday 4/2

**Mecklenburg Revaluation (HB 200 – W. Brawley / SB 159 – Tarte)** Legislation requested by Mecklenburg County to correct issues related to the recent countywide revaluation; HB 200 referred to House Government; SB 159 passed Senate and referred to House Government; HB 200 was heard on 4/4 in House Government where a committee substitute was reported favorably, reported favorably out of House Regulatory Reform and now resides in House Finance

## STATE BUDGET

**Governor’s Budget Proposal:** Governor McCrory announced his budget proposals on Wednesday, March 25; FY 2014 and FY 2015 funding in the amount of \$25 million each year for the Blue Line Extension appears on pages 19 and 300 of the [Recommended Continuation Budget for the Department of Transportation](#), which is consistent with the budget agreement made in 2012 between the NC House and Senate

### **Budget Timeline:**

**Now through late April** – Subcommittees of House and Senate Appropriations’ Committees continue meeting, and receiving reports from State agencies

**Early May** – Senate Appropriation subcommittees make recommendations to Senate Appropriations Committee

**May 7** – Senate Appropriations Committee reports out proposed budget to full Senate

**May 9** – Senate passes budget proposal

**May 30** – House considers Senate proposal and passes its budget proposal, which would commence budget conference process

**June 13** – House and Senate agree upon budget conference report

**Late June** – If the General Assembly is still in session, Governor must sign or veto budget within 10 days after being presented with the bill or it becomes law

## LEGISLATIVE AGENDA

**Film Production Tax Credit:** While action to achieve the City’s objective to repeal the sunset date of the film production tax credit has not taken place, legislation to fundamentally alter the film production tax credit program was introduced that does not further economic development in our region; [HB 994 \(Luebke\)](#) would make the credit “nonrefundable” which means companies would be allowed to waive an equal amount of tax liability over five years — but that would help only those companies based in North Carolina; out-of-state production companies would not benefit; referred to House Rules; [City opposes HB 994](#)

**Long Term Investment Program (SB 276 – Clodfelter)** is local charter bill amending City’s long term investment authority to enable use of “prudent investor” rule; [referred to Senate State and Local Government](#)

**Public Transportation Buses (SB 301 – Graham / HB 375 – Jeter)** SB 301 is a statewide bill increasing maximum allowable length of public transportation buses from 45 to 60 feet, thus allowing use of higher capacity articulated buses; SB 301 referred to Senate Transportation; HB 375 is a local bill allowing buses owned and operated by the City of Charlotte to be up to 60 feet but be operated primarily on roadways with speed limits over 45 miles per hour; HB 375 reported out of House Transportation on 4/9, passed House on 4/10, and referred to Senate Transportation

**Infrastructure Improvements (SB 104 – Hartsell)** eliminates the July 1, 2013 sunset date of the Special Assessments for Critical Infrastructure Needs Act of 2008; SB 104 is consistent with City and MTC legislative agendas that requested extension of sunset date to allow for continued examination of Red Line Regional Rail project and not lose one of the potential sources of funding for the project; referred to Senate Finance

**Transportation Project Financing (SB 322 – Clodfelter)** allows local government to use special obligation bond financing for public transportation projects, thereby facilitating local participation in the federal Transportation Infrastructure Financing and Innovation Act (TIFIA) program; loans are available from the federal government through the TIFIA program for public transportation projects at costs that are competitive with other forms of financing; referred to Senate Finance

**Civil Service Board (SB 299 – Graham)** is charter bill increasing membership of Charlotte Civil Service Board from 7 to 9 members; referred to Senate State and Local Government

## DEVELOPING ISSUES

**Tax Reform:** Several initiatives have been introduced but none of which have moved out of Committee; legislation affecting towns and cities have

SB 363 (Brock) reduces or eliminates several business taxes including the locally imposed business privilege license tax; referred to Senate Finance

SB 394 (Clodfelter) modifies a wide range of taxes including business taxes, personal income taxes, corporate income taxes, including elimination of the locally imposed business privilege license tax, and is structured to be revenue neutral in the aggregate for both the State and local governments; referred to Senate Finance

SB 669 (Rucho) reduces personal income tax rates; referred to Senate Finance

SB 677 (Rucho) reduces corporate income tax rates to 6%; referred to Senate Finance

HB 642 (Conrad) reduces corporate income tax rate to 4.9%; referred to House Finance

**Extraterritorial Jurisdictional Powers (ETJ):** Several bills have been introduced that would

impact the ETJ powers of towns and cities

[HB 70 \(Pittman\)](#) is proposed constitutional amendment that repeals existing extraterritorial jurisdictional (ETJ) powers of all towns and cities, in addition to repealing power of towns and cities to undertake involuntary annexations; referred to House Government; City opposes HB 70

[HB 264 \(Pittman\)](#) is the “Justice for Rural Citizens Act” that repeals authority of cities and towns to exercise ETJ powers in adjacent unincorporated areas due to inability of ETJ residents to vote in municipal elections; referred to House Government; City opposes HB 264

[HB 608 \(Pittman\)](#) limits exercise of ETJ powers to those towns and cities that started exercising such powers prior to June 1, 2013; referred to House Government; HB 608 would have no impact upon the existing ETJ powers of the City of Charlotte

### **Public-Private Partnerships:**

[HB 857 \(Arp\)](#) is a statewide bill sought by the League of Municipalities and Association of County Commissioners to enable design-build for all localities throughout the State, and which does not impact the current powers of the City of Charlotte that have been secured through the years; HB 857 referred to House Government

[HB 887 \(Moffitt\)](#) allows local governments to enter into public-private agreements for the development and operation of public facilities by private entities; HB 887 referred to House Commerce

### **Local Government Authority:**

Property Owners Protection Act (HB 632 – Moffitt) awards attorney fees to successful plaintiffs in land use cases against City, County and State government; referred to House Judiciary Subcommittee B; City opposes HB 632

Zoning/Design & Aesthetic Controls (HB 150 – Dollar / SB 139 – Clodfelter) restricts use of design standards by counties and cities for any residential dwelling subject to the NC Residential Code for One and Two Family Dwellings; several exceptions are granted for dwellings located in historic districts and national registers of historical places, local, State or federal national historical landmarks, manufactured or modular housing, life safety codes, and national flood insurance program areas; SB 139 referred to Senate Commerce; HB 150 passed House and referred to Senate Rules; City opposes HB 150 and SB 139

Regulatory Reform Act of 2013 (SB 612 – Brown) states that local government ordinances or regulations that regulate fields also regulated by the State or federal government and are more stringent than State or federal government standards are inconsistent with State or federal law, which would invalidate many of the City’s environmental regulations covering erosion control, post construction controls, stream buffer protections, nutrient controls, and stormwater detention; referred to Senate Agriculture; City opposes SB 612

Local Government Regulatory Reform (HB 677 – Brawley) prohibits local governments from implementing dues check off programs for union members in the local government workforce; referred to House Regulatory Reform; this bill would negate recent action taken by Charlotte City Council to enact dues check off program; City opposes HB 677

Rental Property Ordinances (HB 773 – Brawley) repeals several portions of legislation passed in 2011 that became basis for 2012 changes to Charlotte rental property ordinance; would prohibit mandatory registration of all rental properties, assessment of fees to properties that reach crime or disorder threshold, and designating violation of the ordinance as a misdemeanor; referred to House Government Committee; while the City is talking with Rep. Brawley about the impacts, there are at least ten other towns and cities that have rental program impacted by this bill; City opposes HB 773

### **Local Government Ethics:**

MPO Ethics (SB 303 – Graham / SB 411 – Rabon) amends 2012 legislation requiring greater disclosure of individuals appointed by local governments to serve on MPO boards; SB 303 exempts the Mecklenburg Union Metropolitan Planning Organization from the 2012 requirements while SB 411 requires any individual with voting authority on a MPO board to follow State Government ethics guidelines; SB 303 referred to Senate Rules; SB 411 reported favorably out of Senate Judiciary I and passed Senate

County and City Ethics (HB 659 – Moffitt) requires all members of governing board of cities, towns and other political subdivisions to file statements of economic interests as if those members were public servants as defined in NCGS 138A-3; reported out of House Government

Towns Enforce Ordinances on Lake Norman (HB 186 – Jeter / SB 142 – Tarte) authorizes towns of Cornelius, Davidson, Huntersville, Mooresville and Troutman to enforce ordinances adopted by the towns on the waters of Lake Norman extending 2,500 feet from the shoreline at the 760 waterline (the 760 waterline indicates that the elevation of the lake is 760' when full); SB 142 referred to Senate State and Local Government; HB 186 was reported favorably out of House Government and re-referred to House Judiciary Subcommittee B

Repeal Combined Motor Vehicle & Registration System (HB 30 – Stevens/ SB 260 – Bingham) repeals the 2005 law that provides for payment of local motor vehicle taxes at the same time the annual state vehicle registration is required; system will soon be going online and is expected to result in a higher rate of taxes collected; HB 30 referred to House Transportation; SB 260 referred to Senate Rules

### **Transportation Tolling:**

HB 267 (Collins) would require General Assembly approval of any tolling projects, which is apparently driven by intense opposition to tolling of I-95; referred to House Transportation

SB 521 (Rabon) and SB 601 (Rabon) make amendments to 2012 legislation that authorized a public-private partnership for adding HOT lanes to I-77 from Uptown to northern Mecklenburg;

SB 601 referred to Senate Transportation, while SB 521 has not been referred to Committee

**Garden Parkway:** Four legislative initiatives potentially imperil the planned Garden Parkway that would connect Charlotte-Douglas International Airport to Gaston County and eventually I-85; the Garden Parkway is considered key to realizing the economic potential of the new Norfolk Southern Railroad intermodal rail yard being constructed at Charlotte-Douglas International Airport

Repeal Certain Turnpike Projects Authorization (SB 716 – Rabon) removes three projects from the list of authorized projects of the North Carolina Turnpike Authority including the Cape Fear Skyway in Wilmington, Mid-Currituck Bridge connecting the outer banks to the mainland, and the Garden Parkway; referred to Senate Transportation

Remove Route Restrictions for NC 540 Loop (HB 10 – Stam) was amended to remove three projects from the list of authorized projects of the North Carolina Turnpike Authority including the Cape Fear Skyway in Wilmington, Mid-Currituck Bridge connecting the outer banks to the mainland, and the Garden Parkway; bill is in conference

Repeal Garden Parkway Authorization/Funding (HB 134 – Bumgardner) would remove the Parkway from the list of authorized turnpike projects; referred to House Transportation

Freedom of Movement in Southwestern North Carolina (HB 932 – Bumgardner) would prohibit the Turnpike Authority from constructing any project that would be located entirely or partially west of the Catawba River and south of the current route of the U.S. 74 highway, which is where the Garden Parkway alignment lies; referred to House Transportation

**BILL FILING DEADLINES**

The last bill filing deadline passed on April 17<sup>th</sup> in the House. However, bills can still be filed in the House on the report of the House Committees of Finance, Appropriations or Rules. Crossover deadline for both chambers is Thursday, May 16.
