Dear Resident:

Charlotte-Mecklenburg Storm Water Services has hired a consultant, Armstrong Glen, P.C., to study and investigate possible improvements to the storm drainage system in the Gaynor Storm Drainage Improvement Project area. The project area covers approximately 155 acres, and is roughly bordered on the north by Hartness Avenue and Randolph Middle School, to the south by Brook Forest Lane, to the east by Addison Drive and Whitby Lane, and to the west by Randolph Road.

The planning-level surveying within the project area is nearly complete, and pipe video efforts have been completed. Storm Water Services and Armstrong Glen are now evaluating the existing conditions within the project area. When analysis is complete a public meeting will be scheduled to present the

findings and solicit input from project area residents. Meeting details will be sent to you by mail approximately two weeks in advance.
