Vice Chairperson Rhodes arrived at the meeting at 5:11 pm after the approval of the September 19, minutes.

Welcome and Introduction

Chairperson Andrew Blumenthal called the meeting to order at 5:06 p.m., welcomed everyone, and introduced each commissioner and staff member.

Virtual Meeting Rules and Guidelines

The meeting was livestreamed on YouTube. A link for the public to view the meeting's livestream is posted on the Planning, Design & Development Department's webpage.

Approval of Minutes

A motion was made by Commissioner Gaston and seconded by Commissioner Shaw to approve the September 19, 2023, minutes. The minutes were unanimously approved. 6-0

Mandatory Referrals

M.R. #23-37| Mecklenburg County Park and Recreation proposes to accept a land donation of Tax Parcels 199-251-05 and 141-171-27 (+/- 1.15 acres) on Dixie River Road from Dixie Land River, LLC.

M.R. #23-38 | Mecklenburg County Park and Recreation proposes to acquire Tax Parcel 015- 223- 10 (+/- 3.680 acres) in the Town of Huntersville for expansion of the Gar Creek nature preserve.

M.R. #23-39| The Charlotte-Mecklenburg Board of Education intends to exchange the former school located at 1400 N. Graham St. (PID 07901729) containing 4.18 acres for the current Mecklenburg County Bar Building at 511 Yellowstone Dr. (PID 06904138).

M.R. #23-40 | Charlotte Mecklenburg Library desires to dispose of the 5,002 square foot building situated on 0.292 acres at 2324 LaSalle Street (PID 06917117).

The Chairperson asked if any of the mandatory referrals should be pulled for discussion. Commissioner Shaw asked about the disposition process for 1400 N. Graham Street property (M.R. #23-39). Jason Pauling, Senior Project Manager explained that the Bar Association and the Board of Education (CMS) are in the process of exchanging properties. The only comment received was from the Historic District Landmark Commission for the properties designation as a historic landmark be disclosed. Anything associated with the development regulations will need to be coordinated with the Historic Landmarks Commission. After further discussion,

Chairperson Blumenthal clarified that the building at Yellow Stone Drive was initially marketed for sale. Nevertheless, CMS has acknowledged they want to use the building. Therefore, the Bar Association is moving to Graham Street and the CMS is moving to Yellow Stone Drive. Commissioner Shaw requested as a follow-up clarification from CMS about the use of the property. After additional discussion, the committee voted.

A motion was made by Commissioner Gaston and seconded by Vice-Chairperson Rhodes stating that the Planning Committee reviewed M.R. #23-37, M.R. #23-38, M.R. #23-39, and M.R. #23-40, on October 17, 2023, and has no additional comments for the submitting agencies. The motion was approved. 7-0

CATAWBA LANDS CONSERVANCY OVERVIEW

Bart Landess, Executive Director, provided an overview regarding the Catawba lands Conservancy. The group's primary focus is saving land and connecting lives to nature. He talked about the protected areas in North Carolina providing details on the economic development and exponential growth which has occurred from 1976 through 2030. The goal is to have good quality of life, a great place to live, while conserving land and protecting the natural environment. Mr. Landess also talked about the NC trails and the benefits of having them.

TREES CHARLOTTE - PROJECT OVERVIEW

Jane Myers, Executive Director, provided a summary about Trees Charlotte. She discussed the different approaches for utilizing trees to reach the community. This included how trees matter in building community, the benefits of Charlotte's Urban Forest, Charlotte's Tree Canopy, and some of the related disparities. She also provided a summary on the natural causes of tree loss. Ms. Myers shared the type of events undertaken through partnerships in the community and how the practice of preservation occurs. Outreach and education are also used to inspire residents to advocate for tree plantings and preservation.

Commissioners asked several questions after each presentation. The following action items resulted from the discussion:

Action Items

- Commissioner Shaw asked for a confirmation from CMS regarding the use of the property at 1400 Graham Street.
- The Chairperson asked for the presenters' contact information and for the distribution of presentations to commissioners.
- Ms. Myers will send link to recommended certified arborist listed on Trees Charlotte's website. This is so that commissioners can learn more about mature tree canopies. Vice Chairperson Rhodes had inquired about mature tree canopies and possible property damage that might result from a tree falling.
- Staff asks that Commissioners continue to spread the news about the area plan process and asks that the community submit images of areas or things that they like about their communities.

Community Area Plan Update

Erin Hinson, Planner talked about how the Community Area Planning effort will provide detailed guidance for growth and development for Charlotte's communities. There are five phases to the process and the result will be 14 Community Area Plans. She also updated the committee on engagement efforts. Kathy Cornett reviewed the details of Phase 2, which primarily focused on policy map changes. Phase 3, Projects and Programs, is expected to include 8 Workshops in the spring. After additional discussion Chairperson Blumenthal updated the committee on his attendance at the Northeast Middle and Outer workshop. He acknowledged staff efforts and complimented Kathy Cornett on her ability to manage expectations at workshops. After additional discussion the meeting was adjourned.

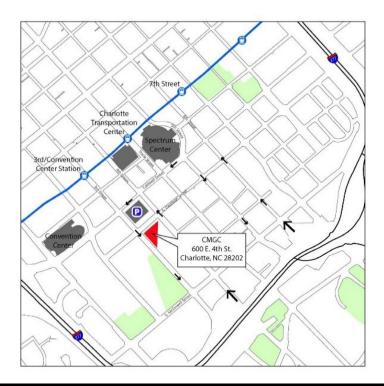

Accessing the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Government Center (CMGC)

CMGC is located at 600 East Fourth Street, at the corner of Fourth and Davidson streets in Uptown Charlotte. From I-85 N, I-77 N and US-74 W, take exit 2A from I-277 S/ NC-16 S onto East Fourth Street. Parking is available in the CMGC parking deck located on Davidson Street between Third and Fourth streets. On-street parking is also available, but CRTPO is only able to validate deck parking. Check in with a staff member about parking validation for the CMGC deck when you arrive for the meeting.

Enter the building either through the entrance at the top of the large staircase on the Davidson Street side of the building, or through the handicapped entrance at the bottom of the large staircase on the right. The handicapped entrance is the only open entrance after 6 p.m. Everyone who enters CMGC undergoes a security screening, after which you may proceed to room 267 on the second floor.

THE CHARLOTTE MECKLENBURG PLANNING COMMISSION

This report covers the period of January 2023 until November 2023 and was prepared by Commission Chairman Douglas A. Welton.

THE COMMISSION

At present, the following individuals are serving as members of the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Planning Commission: Douglas A. Welton, Andrew Blumenthal, Wil Russell, Courtney Rhodes, Terry Lansdell, Melissa Gaston, Ronnie Harvey, Clayton Sealey, Shana Neeley, Rick Winiker, Rebekah Whilden, Erin Shaw, Theresa McDonald, and Robin Stuart.

In 2023, Keba Samuel and Philip Gussman also served on the commission. Both exited the commission as their maximum term expired.

JANUARY 2023

The Planning Commission began the year under the leadership of Chairwoman Keba Samuel and Vice Chairman Philip Gussman. The roster was missing one commissioner due to the resignation of Commissioner Erin Barbee. Ms. Barbee's replacement, Erin Shaw would not be appointed until May 2023.

Commission Focus

As the year began, the commission's work was focussed on the priorities established at the September 2022 retreat. The major initiatives included the following:

- To establish a document of Environmental and Sustainability criteria that could be used to guide decision-making for zoning and mandatory referral recommendations. A Commission subcommittee worked with City Attorney Terrie Hagler-Gray and Planning Department Staff to deliver a document that was adopted in May 2023.
- To provide a forum for the public to gain a greater understanding on the
 work the Commission was engaged in. This exercise took the form of four
 public meetings (one being a cooperative effort with Sustain Charlotte)
 where the commission met with the public.
- 3. To support the Long-range Planning Staff as they rolled out the Community Area Planning Process across the 14 geographies within Charlotte. This exercise took the form of commissioners attending a number of the 21 meetings held during the first half of the year.
- 4. Preparation for the rollout of the Unified Development Ordinance which became effective on June 1st.

Additional Work

The Commission also sought to get a greater understanding of other community factors that affected land use policy within the city. To this extent we sought information about affordable housing and the Corridors of Opportunity program. We received insight into Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools future planning (and bond request). We also had the opportunity to get a deeper understanding of several of Charlotte infrastructure providers (.e., Charlotte Water and Charlotte Fire).

JULY 2023

In July, the Commission leadership transitioned to Chairman Douglas A. Welton and Vice-Chairman Andrew Blumenthal. New Commissioners Theresa McDonald and Robin Stuart were appointed to replace outgoing commissioners Samuel and Gussman.

Commission Focus

At our September retreat, the Commission undertook work to accomplish several bodies of work that would support our direction of enhancing the influence that the commission has in the community, the industry, amongst Planning Staff, and elected officials.

The major initiatives included the following:

- To establish a Pipeline Committee that would identify and vet possible future candidates for the Planning Commission.
- To establish a Community Committee that would invite leaders from the community to various Planning Commission, Zoning Committee, and Planning Committee meetings to expose these leaders to the process of land use planning.
- To Establish a Collaborations Committee to develop synergetic relationships with industry and business advocates that help use accomplish our mission.

Accomplishments to Date

So far, we have:

- Established new institutional relationships with The American Institute of Architects, The Urban Land Institute, The Greater Charlotte Apartment Association, SouthPark Community Partners, University City Partners, Canopy Multiple Listing Service, the University of North Carolina at Charlotte, and The Real Estate & Building Industry Coalition.
- 2. Identified more than a half dozen possible candidates for our future commissioner pipeline.

- 3. Supported the Planning Staff at all of their Community Area Planning Meeting since August, either by being trained to facilitate or just providing additional info as an attendee.
- 4. Worked with REBIC to provide a UDO forum for the Commission that would allow us to get user-level feedback on the successes and opportunities in the new codes.
- 5. Worked with the Park and Rec Commission to provide their strategic Acquisitions Committee with a better understanding of the land acquisition and land-dedication processes. This included joint meetings between selected Park and Rec Commissioners and the Executive Committee of the Planning Commission.
- 6. Since August, Commissioners have attended/presented at dozens of community meetings. Hopefully, this visibility will translate into a better understanding by residents of the land-use planning process in Charlotte. (Now, as a regular part of each full commission meeting, Commissioners report back on their involvement with the community.)
- Members of the Zoning Committee worked with CDOT's Jack Carpenter to develop a better understanding of the processes and protocols that CDOT uses to make their recommendations for rezoning petitions.
- 8. The Commission provided a letter of support for a the City of Charlotte's efforts to get a Pathways to Removing Obstacles Housing Grant.
- Worked with Laura Harmon to understand the process for creating text amendments for the UDO and develop a process, by which, Commissioners could submit their own text amendment request.

Future Activities

2024 looks to be an exciting year for the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Planning Commission. Some of the activities we have scheduled include:

- Urban Plan A cooperative program with the Urban Land Institute to provide a workshop for public officials to learn more about the interconnections and trade-offs involved in land-use planning.
- A look inside of Charlotte's Municipal Service Districts This program will
 provide insight into how Charlotte multiple MSDs are dealing with a
 diverse set of expectations within the current economic development
 environment.
- 3. New Building Technology This program with the American Institute of Architects will provide a view into the new technologies that are affecting land use and the built environment.

- 4. Community Area Planning The Commission will continue our high-level of engagement with the Community Area Planning process as it shifts into its next phase of more infrastructure/amenity-focus.
- The 2040/UDO Alignment Rezoning The Planning Commission will actively engage and provide feedback to the Planning Staff as they develop strategies and tactics for approaching the 2025 Alignment Rezoning.

CHARLOTTE MECKLENBURG PLANNING COMMISSION

CITY COUNCIL RESOLUTION ON BOARDS – ATTENDANCE POLICY (Adopted August 28, 2023 & Effective January 2024)

1. Subcommittee Attendance

For the attendance policy that evaluates three consecutive absences, annual attendance of 65%, or reappointment attendance of 75%:

- Subcommittee meetings should no longer be considered
- Special called meetings of the entire board or board events, however, should still be considered as usual for attendance

2. Excused Absences Policy (Section 5. Attendance Policy)

Excused absences shall not count toward the 65% attendance requirement. Members shall be permitted up to three excused absences per calendar year in the following circumstances:

- Illness or medical-related absences
- > Funerals and/or bereavement
- The birth or adoption of the board member's child, for 90 days after the birth or adoption
- Military service

Excused absence requests should be formally made in writing via email to both City Clerk and the board's staff advisor within one week of the date of the missed meeting (prior or following).

Any absence that does not meet the above criteria shall be considered unexcused.

- The allowance for excused absences shall not apply to meetings of a board, committee, or commission that serves a quasi-judicial function or engages in final-decision making. Subcommittee meetings should no longer be considered
- Special called meetings of the entire board or board events, however, should still be considered as usual for attendance

CHARLOTTE MECKLENBURG PLANNING COMMISSION

3. Excused Absences Policy Applicability

Board member absences may be excused except when a meeting is engaged in final decision-making or quasi-judicial hearings

Some boards may not excuse absences under most circumstances:

Final-decision making:

When the board is voting on funding matters or decisions final and binding for the City, excused absences are NOT allowed. If the board meets to receive information and/or presentations, retreats, or anything that is non-binding, members can be excused for an absence if within the quidelines

- Quasi-judicial hearing attendance cannot be excused but other meetings of the board are allowed excused absences
- Subcommittee meetings should no longer be considered
- Special called meetings of the entire board or board events, however, should still be considered as usual for attendance
