<p>Airport South Campus Fiber Installation</p>	<p>Mayfield/Mayor</p>	<p>Inquired about considering minority-owned firm as a prime contractor not just sub-contractor for this project and other very large projects.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • When Aviation goes through the goal review process for a project, staff pulls a list of MWSBE firms certified to perform the scopes of work involved in the project. • Whether or not subcontracting opportunities on a project are anticipated, staff sends an email out to firms who could potentially perform the work to let them know that the project is out for bid/proposal. Additionally, outreach events are held and firms are encouraged to sign up for project alerts on our website. If they sign up for alerts, they will receive an email notification as soon as any project is advertised. • Firms are encouraged to attend our pre-bid and pre-proposal meetings to learn details about specific projects, meet our staff and, most importantly, network with other firms. Firms who regularly attend pre-bid meetings make successful working relationships with larger firms and get a chance to participate on projects (both with the Airport and in other parts of the City). • For the South Campus Fiber Installation, staff reached out to firms on the CBI list that perform any type of cabling or related work. • Additionally, Aviation held a pre-proposal meeting open to the public for any firm who was interested in learning more about the project and networking with other firms. The details for the meeting were listed on the advertisement and in the email sent to firms. • While we always strive to break down work into feasible units to increase participation, unfortunately, we were unable to break this project into two separate projects. Since it is one continuous fiber there would be no feasible start or stop point in the middle to allow this work to be broken up between two prime contractors. Breaking it up 	<p>Aviation</p>

The top three nuisance violations are consistently curbside violations (e.g. rollout containers, bulky items, yard waste), tall weeds and grass, and neglected / dilapidated conditions. <u>Zoning</u>: HNS Code Enforcement enforces zoning regulations and inspects work completed when zoning permits are issued. This code ensures homeowners and landlords keep residences in safe and sanitary conditions. Examples of violations include inoperable smoke/carbon monoxide detectors, unsafe wiring, no heat, pest infestation, unclean and unsanitary conditions, plumbing defects, space and use, light and ventilation, exit requirements, structural standards, ect. ● High volume violations occur in the following areas: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Minimum Housing Code – Areas that have older housing stock and/or larger numbers of rental units tend to have more housing code cases. ○ Nuisance – Areas that have more rental units often have greater nuisance cases such as bulky items left at the curb when renters move, tall weeds and grass, etc. In addition, areas with engaged citizens

			<p>that call 311 to report violations can result in numerous nuisance cases.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Zoning – Zoning violations can often be driven by new businesses and new construction or rehabilitation. As such, areas that are experiencing change that result in new businesses, renovations and new construction will often have a higher number of zoning cases. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Code Enforcement enforces code regulations uniformly throughout the city, including graffiti. Graffiti on public property such as streets, street signs and sidewalks is always removed through the enforcement process. ● When graffiti is identified on private property, the city works with the property owner to determine whether or not the graffiti needs to be removed. Graffiti - whether writings, drawings, inscriptions, figures or marks - defaces property and is done illicitly and without the property owners permission. ● Alternatively, art, done with the owner’s permission, is not considered graffiti. If, however, the art promotes a business, it is considered a sign and is subject to the sign ordinance. ● Code Enforcement staff is available to meet with property owners who have questions about the notices of violation that they receive. ● <u>Code and Zoning regulation updates</u>. Updates have occurred as follows: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ The Health & Sanitation Code (nuisance) was reviewed in 2017 and an updated ordinance was passed by Council and became effective January 1, 2018.

Infractions cited. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A "Saturation Patrol" consists of additional CMPD patrol vehicles assigned to travel along an identified roadway. When having an articulable reason, the officer will stop a vehicle to check license and registration that may result in charges for violations of the law, i.e., DWI, Driving With License Revoked, Open Container, etc. • A "Checkpoint" consists of officers physically set up on a roadway to stop vehicles to check for impaired drivers. Similar to a "Saturation Patrol" other violations of the law may be identified. <p>Saturation Patrols and Checkpoints typically begin at 8:30 PM and can continue until 3:00 AM. Saturation Patrols and Checkpoints are occasionally terminated during inclement weather and/or when there is not a sufficient number of officers to safely conduct a checkpoint. This occurs when those officers assigned to the checkpoint have arrested multiple persons for a traffic law violation(s) and have to transport those persons to jail leaving an insufficient number of officers to safely conduct the checkpoint.</p> <p>Checkpoint locations are generally set in November of the year prior to the events.
