**SUBJECT:** Week 6 State Legislative Report

#### What You Need to Know

Charlotte Citizens Review Board/Subpoena Powers (<u>HB 350 – R. Moore, Autry</u>) is the local legislation requested by the City to extend subpoena powers to the Citizens Review Board. Senator Bishop is still considering the city requested legislation and introduced a "blank bill", 39<sup>th</sup> Senatorial District Local Act (<u>SB 288 – Bishop</u>) to serve as a placeholder.

No Stormwater Fees on Taxiways and Runways (<u>HB 275 – Conrad, Torbett, Presnell, Hunter</u>) exempts Airports from paying stormwater fees on taxiways and runways, so long as the exempted fees are used for economic development. HB 275 referred to State and Local Government II, then Finance Committees.

Wireless Communication Siting (<u>HB 310 – Saine, Dollar, Malone, Murphy</u>) mandates processes that local governments must follow when regulating wireless communications infrastructure (sometimes referred to as DAS or small cell technology) in city owned rights-of-ways. HB 310 would preempt the standards and provisions recently released by the Charlotte Department of Transportation.

**Special Separation Allowance for Firefighters** (<u>HB 340 – Dollar, Malone, Saine, Clampitt</u>) mandates a new benefit for firefighters similar to the separation allowance for law enforcement officers, that would provide income for retired firefighters up to the age of qualifying for social security. Fiscal impact is roughly estimated at between \$2.25 million and \$2.75 million annually to the City of Charlotte.

**Firefighters Death Benefits/Cancers** (<u>HB 355 – Saine, Dollar, Malone, Murphy</u>) adds rectal cancer, esophageal cancer, oral cavity cancer, brain cancer, non-hodgkin's lymphoma, and multiple myeloma to the list of cancers that are presumed to kill firefighters in the line of duty.

**Local Option Sales Tax Flexibility** (<u>HB 333 – S. Martin, Hunter, Watford, Saine</u>) establishes a new local option sales tax for public education of increments of one-quarter percent up to one-half percent, which would have to be approved at referendum. HB 333 also caps local option sales tax rates. The rate for Mecklenburg County would be capped at 2.75%, which would leave another 0.25% of local option sales tax authority.

House Judiciary II Committee reported out the **Citizens Protection Act of 2017** (HB 63 – Warren, Collins, Jordan, Adams), which amends the 2015 sanctuary city legislation (HB 318) to add penalties for cities and counties that enact "sanctuary city" ordinances, resolutions, policies, etc. Proposed committee substitute enhances the penalties to include losing for one fiscal year state Powell Bill revenues, and state collected local revenues from beer and wine, telecommunications, video programming and piped natural gas taxes. These revenues total approximately \$41.5 million annually for the City of Charlotte. HB 63 will next be heard by the House Finance Committee.

### State Legislative Agenda

**Police Recordings:** Staff is working on this statewide request through the NC Metropolitan Mayors Coalition, which has convened a workgroup of city attorneys to work through this issue and recommend legislative changes.

**Strategic Transportation Investments:** Staff understands that Senate Transportation Committee chairs are working on legislation to revise the Strategic Transportation Investments program to provide more benefits to rural areas.

Strategic Transportation Investments: Transportation Megaproject Funding (<u>HB 219 – Torbett</u>) was recommended by the House Select Committee on Strategic Transportation Planning and Long Term Funding Solutions. HB 219 would create a new program to fund large-scale transportation projects of over \$200 million in value. HB 219 calls for a workgroup to be established to develop criteria for selecting projects.

Sales Tax Redistribution: Change the Local Option Sales Tax Adjustment Factors (<u>SB 126 – Brown</u>) amends the adjustment factors applied to the half-cent local Article 40 sales tax levy and replaces with a factor based on the county's economic tier designation. Tier 1 counties, which are the most economically distressed counties in the State, would be assigned a factor of 1.10. Tier 2 counties would receive no adjustments and Tier 3 counties would be assigned a factor of 0.90. According to estimates prepared by the non-partisan Fiscal Research Division, approximately \$932,000 more in sales tax revenue would accrue to the City of Charlotte.

Charlotte Firefighters Retirement System (<u>HB 58 – Dulin, Autry, Belk, R. Moore</u> / <u>SB 54 – Waddell, Tarte, Bishop</u>) is local legislation that enables the Retirement System to comply with the Voluntary Correction Program entered into with the Internal Revenue Service, by which the method for computing a firefighters final average salary is determined. The bill has no fiscal impact upon the System. HB 58 passed the House.
